PORTLAND, Ore., May 2 (AP)—With the exception of fresh standard extras in eggs, which advanced half a cent to 28 1/2c, the lighter and egg market remained unchanged today. Current egg receipts were still quoted at 26 1/2c as the top price.
Both eggs and butter were maintaining a firm tone, with buyers apparently more in evidence than sellers.

Wheat Weak And Lower At Close

CHICAGO, May 2 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 1/2c higher, wheat later showed a general decline and tended downward, starting at 1/2c off to 1/2c up, and subsequently receding all around. Oats were firm. Provisions likewise tended to advance.
Wheat closed weak, 1/2 to 1 1/2c off; lower, corn 1/2 to 5/8c down, oats 1/2 to 3/4c off, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 1/2c.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, May 2 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:
"Wooling has been heavier in the new clip wools this week, more especially in Texas, where a good five million pounds has been brought from the growers at prices which generally are estimated to mean a clean cost, landed Boston, of 85 to 90c for 12 months wool, according to shrinkage. Elsewhere throughout the west, buying has been rather scattered."
