Berlin May Day Riots Fatal To 27 Last 3 Days

BERLIN, May 4 (AP)—The number of dead in the communist May day disorders of the past three days reached 27 today with the deaths of six wounded persons in various hospitals.

Among the dead was an English newspaperman, Charles Brad Mackay, representing the Waltham Daily News of New Zealand. Police on Hermannstrasse shot him dead before dawn today when he refused to go back indoors in defiance of their orders permitting no one outside.

Mackay spoke no German and his friends assumed he did not understand the commands which shouted at him three times before the shots which killed him were fired. The police pointed out that they had forbidden newspapermen to enter the disturbed area after 9 p. m.

him three feet out of your chair and cheer."

In the city of San Felipe, where Andrew Ogden is killed, and the dilapidated houses of the deserted town of Torridity, where riotous miners once drank, gambled, played, fought and killed, Booth's characters untangle the web of mystery surrounding the murder.

Legends and myths of Skull Valley are profuse. Dominating them all is the picturesque character, Alex Peterson, overlord of Torridity in its heyday; Peterson who carried two pistols, with golden fillings and golden bullets. He was the central figure in a poker game that "cracked the town" and had as its stake a human life.

There is the gripping romance of Lucy, dark-eyed, beautiful niece of Peebles, who participates in the investigation, and Jerry Ogden, who is accused of the murder of his father.

Old Furie, a "desert rat," is one of the most vivid characterizations of the story. MacNair, a retired detective, comes back to help solve the mystery and one of the other investigators is Chief of Police Deacon.

"Gold Bullets" was published in book form in January of this year and The Observer presents it first as a serial, beginning Monday, May 6, through its membership in The Association Press Evening Paper Feature Service.
