TIGERS WIN EAST OREGON TRACK TITLE

Fifth Consecutive Victory for La Grande High School Athletes.

NEW RECORD IS MADE IN DISCUS

Rain in Afternoon Slows up Finals—Tigers Take Four Firsts and Tie for Another.

In spite of a steady rain, that slowed up the track and made it next to impossible to surpass or even equal marks made during the morning preliminaries, the La Grande High school Tigers rolled up an imposing total of 85 points Saturday afternoon, winning a fifth consecutive Eastern Oregon track and field title.

Only one record was broken during the day—that in the morning—but it was smashed twice, King, versatile Pendleton athlete, threw the platter 112 feet 11 inches, a foot and an inch farther than the record-breaking throw made by Earl of Union in 1925.

THREE DUTCH STORES WILL BE ERECTED

K. J. McWilliams announces \$40,000 Expansion Program Today.

EYCAVATION WORK TO BEGIN IN WEEK

Two Locations Have Been Purchased—Stores Will Sell Bakery Products and Ice Cream.

K. J. McWilliams, of the La Grande Bakery company, today announced a program of expansion involving about \$40,000, which will feature the erection of three Dutch stores in La Grande and also erection of Dutch stores in Pendleton and Baker.

Mr. McWilliams has purchased two locations, one at Hemlock and Adams and the other on the triangular lot across the street from L. C. Smith's garage. Excavation work is expected to begin within a week.

The Dutch stores are something entirely new in this district, consisting of very attractive structures, practically square at the base, and topped with a revolving windmill of the Dutch type.

The purpose of the three Dutch stores will be to merchandise bakery products and ice cream. The ice cream will be made in the main Dutch store and a \$4,500 ice cream plant is to be installed in the window so that the public may witness its operation.

Light Brown And Blue The main Dutch store will be 24 by 24 feet in dimensions and the other two will be 21 by 24 feet.

SENATE WILL LIMIT DEBATE ON PROPOSAL

Action Will be Taken on Debenture Plan After 2 p. m. Wednesday.

LEADERS ENGAGE IN VOTE BATTLE

Both Opponents and Proponents Claim Victory—Mellon and Tariff Scraps are next.

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—The senate agreed today to limit debate after two o'clock on Wednesday on the export debenture plan of the farm relief bill.

Leaders Working Diligently Leaders of both groups are working diligently to hold their forces in line and guild up their strength. Assuming that they will be able to command a full attendance, most of them concede that the situation hinges on the success or failure of the debenture proponents in their efforts to obtain "pairs" for their two colleagues who are ill and of one side or the other in winning over the doubtful member.

The holding of the senate in session Saturday was not enough to satisfy all of the members who want to express their views on the debenture issue. Half a dozen remained to be heard today and tomorrow before Chairman McNary of the agriculture committee, who is in charge of the measure and believes incorporation of the debenture provision in the bill would lead to a presidential veto, can hope to bring it to a vote.

Would Clear Way for Vote This would clear the way for a vote on the debenture proposition, strongly opposed by President Hoover, probably late Wednesday afternoon.

The proposal was offered by Chairman McNary of the agriculture committee and was accepted by Senator Robinson, democrat, Arkansas, after it had been modified to permit each senator to speak once for not more than 20
