

# Local News In Brief

**Return From Wallace, Idaho.**—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cleavinger and Mrs. E. E. Bohan returned last night from Wallace, Idaho, where they had been called last Wednesday by the death of their mother, Mrs. Doe Cleavinger. They were accompanied home by Mr. Cleavinger's brother, Walter Cleavinger, and daughter, Miss Helene, of Wallace, Idaho, who will visit here for about two weeks, and Mr. Cleavinger's sister, Mrs. Frank Hazelwood, of Myrtle Point, Oregon, who will have a few days visit in La Grande. The death of the elder Mrs. Cleavinger removed one of the early pioneers of the Grande Ronde valley. Mrs. Cleavinger was one of the women who entered the valley following an arduous trip in a covered wagon from Nebraska, the train arriving here in 1831. The home for years was in the Summerville neighborhood and Mr. and Mrs. Cleavinger managed the Summerville hotel over a period of years. Mr. Cleavinger passed on about ten years ago.

appeared in 5:08. Nowland, in the high hurdles, did not permit the mud to slow him, but won a bit, winning in 17 1-5 seconds compared with his 17 flat in the morning on a fairly dry track. In the low hurdles the story was different. Price won his heat in the morning in 27 4-5 seconds but could only place second in the afternoon with the minor turning of the low hurdle race near the end but slipped in the mud after hitting one of the barriers, and lost enough ground to finish no better than fourth.

**Two Mac-Hi Firsts.**—Markham, of Mac-Hi, won the 100-yard dash in the last 10 feet from Keffer but was soundly trounced in the 220-yard dash, Keffer maintaining a lead most of the distance and finishing like a whirlwind. Nelson, of Mac-Hi, outdistanced the other first place for Milton-Freewater by winning the javelin with a throw of 153 feet 10 inches.

**Union's strongest showing was in the shot put. Parent winning first and Mires second. Parent's toss was just half an inch short of 60 feet.**

**In total firsts Pendleton led La Grande with six to the Tigers four and two-thirds. La Grande, however, took six seconds to Pendleton's three.**

The Tigers scored in every event of the day, but Pendleton failed to get a point in the javelin and only one in the pole vault. 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**PATIENTS IN ASYLUM SAVED FROM FLAMES**  
MORRISTON, N. J., May 6 (AP)—Four thousand patients at the insane at Greystone, near Morris Plains were terrified by a fire that burned part of the main building early today. From the right wing, which was destroyed, 1,400 men were removed to safety. For a time it seemed as if much more of the institution would be destroyed and plans were made to move 1,000 women in an adjoining wing. The men from the right wing were put in sections remote from the fire. Starting in the cupola, the fire ate its way down to the fifth story of the fish wing before it was discovered. Quick work on the part of the institution's fire department and the attendants, doctors and nurses, prevented injury to any of the inmates in the darker zone.

**Hoover Praises Alfred E. Smith**  
NEW YORK, May 6 (AP)—President Hoover regards Alfred E. Smith, his democratic opponent in the recent national campaign, a distinguished American and a great public servant.

The president's estimate of Mr. Smith was expressed in a letter read last night at the presentation of the Lactare Medal, the annual award of the University of Notre Dame to the American lay Catholic "who in his particular field of endeavor has achieved such distinction as reflects glory upon the Catholic faith."

In his speech of acceptance, Mr. Smith referred to the president's letter saying: "I am very thankful to the president of the United States for his kind note of greeting."

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**MISSIONARY TELLS OF NEW GUINEA**

There is a hospital in each of the 20 mission stations. Mr. Knautz reported, with a missionary in charge of each. This it was pointed out, is a very important phase of mission work. Healing men's bodies gives a very wonderful opportunity to preach the gospel, for through this ministry confidence is gained, and without first winning the confidence of the natives, other work is absolutely impossible, the speaker said. The white man is a ghost or a god, according to these people, and the mere sight of one is enough to send the entire population scurrying here and there to avoid him. But once his confidence is gained, there is no end to the trust and confidence placed in the worker.

**Constantly In Fear**  
The entire life of these people, according to Mr. Knautz seems to be to appease the spirits that hover about everywhere, good spirits and bad. The people live in constant fear of everyone and everything. At death the spirit of the departed goes out to a village which is its habitation from then on, but it comes back to bring harm and on the part of the relatives, particularly the near relatives, there is always a frantic effort to so dispel themselves that the spirit may not recognize the husband, the wife, etc., who has been left.

What might at first seem to be very crude methods are resorted to to bring the natives in touch with the Christian religion. But they are won through many avenues. Here the natives must be instructed for five years before they are received as church members and baptized. Sometimes they are not received then. Sometimes as many as 250 are baptized at one time. The missionaries have supervision over a great many villages and the work is constantly growing. The country was described as being very mountainous and the traveling slow and hazardous, but paths had been made and the territory could be covered. According to Mr. Knautz, New Guinea contains more unexplored territory than any other country on the face of the globe.

Mr. and Mrs. Knautz and their young son are here visiting at the home of his brother, Paul Knautz, in the Iowa district, having reached this country on his first foray about the holiday time. This was his former home and he is having the opportunity to renew many old acquaintanceships. From here they will go to North Dakota to visit among Mrs. Knautz's people.
