LOS ANGELES, May 6 (AP)—Chemists were examining stains on the inside of a trunk and on small knives belonging to Leland Wea-ley Abbott here today, in a new effort to solve the "Lorna" mur-der mystery.

Abbott was to face three former fellow workmen, Ray Martin, Wil-liam Brown and William Spence, in the office of Captain W. J. Hight of the sheriff's homicide squad for renewed questioning. "These men assert that Abbott told them he was going to 'get even' with his wife and adding that there was 'plenty of quicksand' in the Los Angeles river, near Lynwood. It was on April 4 that the body of a woman from which the head, legs and arms had been severed, was found in this river.

Since his arrest at a federal fore-st service camp near here Satur-day, Abbott has insisted that he had not married. He admitted telling fellow employees he had a wife in Lynwood he intended to "finish" so he would have an excuse to leave his job here and return to it next winter when the forest service employment ended. He also said he had promised to try to find a three-year old son of Mrs. Mary Spau, a friend, and had asked to borrow the automobile for this purpose.
