Closing Heavy In Wall Street; Money Rate Up

NEW YORK, May 6 (AP)—An unexpected advance from 10 to 12 per cent in the call money rate returned the course of prices reactionary in today's stock market after an early outburst of strength had carried a score issue into new high ground.

Early gains of 1 to 7 1/2 points were cut down or wiped out in the heavy mid-day selling movement and a long list of stocks sagged one to six points below Saturday's final quotations.

Call money renewed at 10 per cent, but the supply at that figure was insufficient to meet the demand.

A new lull fell by the oils and aviation shares lost its strength when call money reached 14 per cent in the last hour during the rise Standard Oil of New Jersey and California had eclipsed their previous highs for the year and Wright Aero had risen eight points. In the last half hour renewed pressure drove some of the high priced shares downward, including Adams Express which fell 20 points, and Commercial Solvent and Advance Rumely preferred, off about nine each. Radio slumped five. The closing was heavy.

Sales approximated 4,100,000 shares.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 6 (AP)—Plans for a \$50,000,000 merger of agricultural implement companies are being made, it was revealed here today by W. O. Munsell, president of Mitchell, Lewis, and Staver, farm implement firm of Spokane and Portland. The project would merge the Oliver Chilled Plow Works of South Bend, Ind.; the Hart-Parr Tractor company of Charles City, Ia.; Nichols and Shepard of Battle Creek, Mich., and the American Seedling Machine company of Springfield, Ohio, into the Oliver Farm Equipment company, he said.

Builder of Glider Critically Injured

SANTA MONICA, Cal., May 6 (AP)—Paul D. Chamberlain, 21-year-old builder and pilot of a glider which crashed at Clover Field Sunday afternoon, was in a critical condition with a slight chance of surviving his injuries. Surgeons stated he had suffered internal injuries, concussion of the brain and four fractures of the pelvis in addition to the broken ankle previously mentioned as his chief injury.

The glider, which was being towed by an automobile to launch it, nose-dived when 25 feet in the air.
