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Football Star Killed During Tussle For Gun

NEW YORK, May 9 (AP)—Ed Hill, star halfback of New York university's great football team, was shot and killed here in a playful struggle for a policeman's revolver.

The shooting occurred outside a police booth near the college, a favorite congregating place for the students. The patrolman, Joseph Green, was absolved of criminal blame by District Attorney John E. McSheehan of Bronx county but was suspended from duty.

Green said Hill and John Bunyan, a former N. Y. U. guard, had stepped at the booth to talk to him when Hill spied two girls strolling down the street and asked the policeman for his nightstick "to chase them away."

The policeman refused and a friendly struggle started. During the struggle, Green said, Hill grabbed his service revolver from his holster and when he attempted to regain it the weapon discharged. The bullet pierced Hill's left breast, killing him instantly.

Bunyan corroborated the policeman's story. Hill was hurried to Poughkeeps hospital but was pronounced dead upon arrival.

WALKER WINS FROM EDWARDS IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9 (AP)—George Walker, Canadian heavy-weight wrestling champion, defeated Billy Edwards, "Kansas City" here last night, in a rough match which ended in a free-for-all with both wrestlers, referee, several spectators and policemen mixing in a lively tussle in the ring after Walker was awarded the third fall, when Edwards started swinging his fists at Walker. Edwards won the first fall with a double reverse Japanese toe-hold after wearing Walker down with his knuckle headlock. After 12 minutes Walker hooked Edwards with a crab hold, the latter pounding the crab to save himself. After four minutes wrestling Walker again forced Edwards to pound the canvas with another crab hold. Walker had 14 pounds weight advantage in coming in at 196 to 182 1/2 for Edwards.

43 SCHOOLS IN CORVALLIS MEET

Expect Nearly 500 High School Athletes at State Track Event.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 9 (Special)—The entrance of Prineville in the state track meet to be at Corvallis Saturday increases the number of schools entered above last year's record, there being 43 schools signed at present as compared with 42 competing in 1928. More schools are expected to enter yet, says Paul J. Schuster, as a few always come in the last few days.

Preparations have been completed for the housing of the hundreds of visiting athletes with their coaches. The various living groups on the campus are co-operating in the housing. While athletes pay their own transportation to and from Corvallis they are the guests of the associated students while on the Oregon State college campus.

Trials Saturday
Past figures show that the average number of entrants a high school is ten. On this basis then there will be anyway 430 competing high school trackmen. This will involve preliminaries in a number of events. These trial heats will be run off Saturday morning with the finals being in the afternoon.

Track enthusiasm is spreading all over the state more and more entrants in the meet indicate. High schools from all corners of the state that competed last year are back to vie again, while many new entrants from widely scattered sections are on hand.

Fourteen schools that did not compete last year are among the 43 entered to date. They are Gold Beach, Albany, McMinnville, Chewawa, Madras, The Dalles, Hood River, Gold Hill, Jefferson, Dallas, Lebanon, Port Orford, Parkdale and Oakland.

Hubbell lost all chance of a no-man-to-first-base game almost as soon as he entered the box. Travis Jackson made a giddy toss past first base of "Sparky Adams" grounder, and the wee infielder, raced to second. Lloyd Waner's sacrifice sent him to third, and Hubbell was concerned more with preventing the Pirates from scoring than in pitching a no-hit game.

The Giants continued yesterday to hit home runs. Mel Ott got two, lifting his total to six, the best National league figure, and Phillips and Andy Cohen got one apiece.

Waite Hoyt won his fourth straight. Lou Gehrig hit his seventh home run of the season, and the Yankees collected their sixth success in a row.

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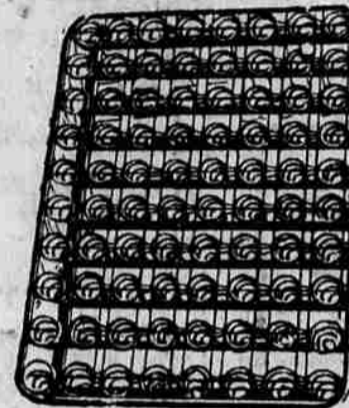
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Pitchers Have Their Day In Coast League
