O. S. C. Election Held Irregular

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 9 (AP)—Declaring that the recent Oregon State college student body election was conducted in an irregular manner and that those elected are holding office illegally, President Kerr of the state college has ordered a new election, arrangements for which will be made in cooperation with a faculty board.

Petitions and affidavits protesting against the election had been presented by students. A special committee examined many witnesses in an investigation which followed filing of the petitions.

The investigation revealed, it was found, that the student body constitution had been ignored in "Fundamental Respect" and that voting had been irregular in many instances.
