TWO AMERICANS LEAD IN GULLANE

Leo Diegel in First Place Despite Hagen's Record-Breaking 67.

TWO AMERICANS—GULLANE, Scot., May 9 (AP)—Leo Diegel with a smashing 69, took the lead away from Walter Hagen today after 36 holes of play in the British open golf championship. Diegel's score for the two days was 140 while Hagen had compiled a 36-hole total of 142 with a score of 67 today.

Diegel scored 71 yesterday when Hagen took 75. The professional champion of the United States, who has been playing sensational golf since his arrival in England with the American Ryder Cup team, went out in 34 strokes today and came home in 35.

Allies in Third Place—Percy Alliss, yesterday's leader with 69, took 76 but was in temporary third place with a score of 145. Johnny Farrell and Bobby Cruickshank were next with 147 and Bill Melhorn, Tommy Armour and Aubrey Boomer had totals of 148.

The record breaking 67 today gave Walter Hagen, Captain of the American Ryder Cup team, a big lead over the early finishers in the second round of championship play for the British open golf title. Hagen's sensational round, two strokes under the course record set yesterday by Percy Alliss of Great Britain, gave the American star a 36-hole total of 142 and established him as a formidable contender for his fourth British open championship.

"The Hair" captured Britain's chief golfing prize in 1922, 1924 and again last year. Tied at 152, ten strokes behind Hagen, were Ed Dudley, Young Wilmington, Del., pro and two British entrants T. P. Perkins, British amateur title-holder, and Henry Cotton, young pro. George Duncan, a veteran of many an open championship, was two strokes back with 154.

Lowest Round on Record—Scores such as attend the winning of the championship itself, occurred around the big eighteenth green when Hagen returned his 67. The score marked the lowest round ever made in the open championship. It was a stroke lower than Bobby Jones' great 68 in the opening round at St. Andrew's two years ago.

On the eighteen holes, more than 6,000 yards long, Hagen never did worse than equal par on any hole. He scored five birdies and two eagles.

Hagen played with supreme confidence all the way and his putting was as good as any he ever has done.

Bigger Wheat Crop Expected This Year

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—The department of agriculture reported today that a winter wheat crop of 595,335 bushels was indicated by the May 1 condition of 82.6 per cent of normal.

Last year's production of winter wheat was 578,964,000 bushels, and the five year average production was 599,257,000 bushels.

Credit Situation Cause of Break

NEW YORK, May 9 (AP)—Extreme nervousness over the credit situation is reflected in the highly irregular movement of prices in today's stock market. Prices started upward with the opening, turned sharply reactionary before midday and then made irregular recovery. Much of the day's selling is believed to have been inspired by the cautionary advice of some of the large commission houses which suggested the possibility of a large increase in brokers' loans and a higher rediscount. Mid-day selling movement was checked by the reduction in call money from 14 to 12 per cent, the first change in three days.
