Arranging For Passenger Trips

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10—Regardless of air mail arrangements for the last link of the Portland-Salt City route, Varney Air Lines, Inc., will come into Portland this summer with a passenger service between the two cities. L. D. Cuddeback, vice president and manager in charge of the Varney lines said. And when the big tri-motor Fokkers carrying 14 passengers are put on the run, about August 1, there will be a hangar 150 feet square at Swan Island to accommodate them, according to plans authorized by the Port of Portland commission.

Mr. Cuddeback conferred with James H. Polhemus, manager of the Port of Portland about the request of the Varney company for a hangar at Swan Island for the company's planes. According to present commission plans, a hangar is to be erected for general use of visiting planes. Later if a separate hangar for use of Varney mail and passenger planes exclusively is desired, that may be built in addition, Mr. Polhemus said.
