## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
If you are spending sleepless nights this spring, try the simple and homely remedy of eating onions.

Make an onion sandwich to eat just before going to bed. Onions are said to be an excellent natural tonic most effective for calming tired nerves and inducing sleep. While many persons find raw onions difficult to digest, their iron content is much higher before cooking than after. If they are cooked, they should be served in a sauce made with the water in which they were cooked or they should be cooked in as little water as possible and that water absorbed by the vegetable.

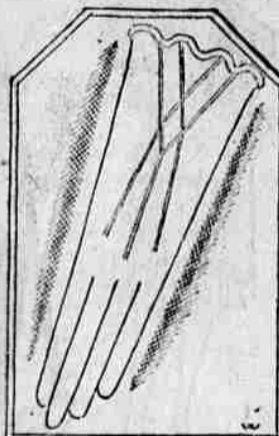
The green tops of spring onions are an excellent source of vitamin A and iron if they are used. Wash and chop carefully and serve shredded with shredded leaf lettuce as a salad.

Cream of onion soup is ideal for luncheon or family dinner. Milk is added to the diet and none of the ash constituents of the onions are lost in serving.

When raw onion is added to a salad, it should be very firmly minced, or when wanted only for seasoning, just the juice used. Many people who have difficulty in digesting raw "dry" onions have no trouble with the tender spring ones. But while every housekeeper should serve onions to her family as often as she can, she should use care in adding them to a salad that is to be served to guests.

The tender spring onions are not strong juiced as the dry ones are and make a truly delicate and delicious vegetable when served creamed on toast.

**Creamed Spring Onions**  
New onions, 4 onions of toast, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 1/2 cup cream, butter, salt, pepper.  
Allow four or five onions for each person. Use all the white part and an inch or more of the green. Clean and hold in salted water until tender. Butter toast and sprinkle lightly with cheese. Arrange
