

Helen Wills Is Thrilled After Meeting Queen

LONDON, May 10 (AP)—Helen Wills, who abandoned tennis for royalty for a few hours yesterday, left for The Hague today "a very thrilled" American girl.

The young Californian, who has been through many grueling sports ordeals with unflinching calm, showed a typical debutante's excitement as she related her emotions on her presentation to Queen Mary.

"It was perfectly beautiful," she said as she hurriedly packed her court gown and tennis frocks to catch an early morning train. "I was not a bit nervous. Everything was managed so well that one felt always at ease. It was really beautiful, the whole scene was so colorful. Never as long as I live shall I forget it."

The tennis star had nothing to say about the "mob scenes" that were enacted last night on the mall as she waited in a parked car for her entrance to Buckingham palace. The curiosity of throngs of spectators fighting their way through the crowds shouting "we want Helen" did not bother the champion.

She declared that her receptions in England have always been marvellous and that she could not understand why they were so good to her.

The American girl made a pleasing picture last night in a simple ivory satin frock free of all trimming and the policemen handling the crowd said that she was not only the most popular American debutante, but also one of the best looking.

Jurors Fail To Reach Verdict In Toledo Case

TOLEDO, Ore., May 10 (AP)—After deliberating twenty hours, the jury trying Sylvanus Neal on a first degree murder charge reported at 10 a. m. today that it was deadlocked and unable to agree, and was discharged by Judge Hamilton. Neal was tried for the shooting of his neighbor, Fred Fox, near Harlan on March 18, last. A new trial will be ordered. Neal is in jail.

Throughout the trial the wife of the defendant and the widow of Fox, each with six small children, have been present in the court room. Counsel for the defense as well as attorneys for the state referred to these dependents frequently during the procedure.

Neal pleaded self-defense. He said Fox accosted him as he was riding a horse along the highway, and endeavored to pull him from the horse. Neal shot Fox, he said, only after he found himself unable to come with the man in any other way.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict of manslaughter.
