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Yanks Continue To Pile Up Wins; Eighth Straight

 Will the Yankees again beat their field to a pulp by May 30, as usual? Another step in that direction was taken yesterday when the champions battered the Tigers for a 10 to 5 decision at Navin Field as the Indians upset the whitewash bucket on the Athletics 9 to 0. The Yanks won their straight victory, and increased their lead over the second place Mackmen to one and one half games.

The Yankee attack consisted of 13 hits for 23 bases, including Babe Ruth's sixth homer and Bob Meusel's third.

Walter Miller, the Cleveland southpaw, afflicted at the obsequies over the Athletics. The Indians raked Babe Wallberg for four runs in the third and four more in the fourth before Mr. Mark called for help. By that time it was unnecessary.

Browns Shake Heat Sox
 The Browns recovered from the Yankees blow sufficiently to shade the Red Sox by 4 to 3. Jack Ogden had just that much edge over Charlie Ruffing. Washington rounded out the day by setting down the White Sox in Chicago, 4 to 2.

While Earl Clark, the Boston center fielder, set a new major league record by smacking 12 Cincinnati flies and making one assist at Braves' field, the Reds subdued the Braves, 5 to 3. They had to have the help of Rabbit Maranville's first 1929 error to do it. The defeat dropped the Braves momentarily into third place, with the Pirates only half a game distant following their 11 to 9 victory over the Phillies yesterday. The Buccaneers overcame an adverse margin of seven runs scored in the first inning.

Cubs, Cards Go Ahead
 The more serious fighting on the National League front saw the Cubs and the Cardinals lockstep their way through the Giants and the Robins, respectively. This double victory kept the Bruins in front, leading the Red Birds by one game.

The Cubs found little or no difficulty in reducing the pitching of John J. McGraw in the first game of what both clubowners looked hopefully forward to as a crucial engagement.

Root added his own case with a homer in the sixth with two men aboard, but could not last out the game. Cuyegros dashed to the rescue in the New York sixth as Root forced a Giant home on a base on balls. Kiki Cuyler continued his batting debauch with one home run and a single.

Baxter Vance found himself unable to turn back the Cardinals single handed and Brooklyn was whitewashed by 4 to 0.

Boston Fielder Sets Up Record

BOSTON, May 11 (AP)—Earl Clark, Boston Braves centerfielder, yesterday established a new major league record by making 12 put-outs and an assist in the game with Cincinnati, which the victors won, 5 to 3. The previous record, 11 put outs, was shared by five players, Dick Harley of the Cardinals, T. F. Hartzel of the Cubs, Happy Felsch of the White Sox, Max Carey, playing with the Pirates when he tied the mark, and Johnny Mostil of the White Sox.

All of Clark's put outs resulted from fly balls, and his lone assist came in the first inning when he threw home to Speaker, who nailed Swanson trying to score.

LONDON, May 11 (AP)—Golfing experts found themselves at a loss today for adjectives in describing Walter Hagen's fourth victory in the British open championship. Although Britons generally had expected after the Ryder cup matches that some home-bred would halt the American invasion in the open editorial comment was unanimous in accepting Hagen's victory with good grace.

"Hagen the wizard! There is no other description to apply to this wonder goffer," said sporting life. "The man is really unique. Adversity spurs him on and the more difficult his task the greater go he plays."

Utterly unperturbed That he showed himself utterly unperturbed by his defeat in the Ryder cup matches was regarded by the writers as a special indication of his greatness.

"The man who can thus recover his nerve and his confidence deserves to win," said the Express. Paying tribute to his extraordinary courage in bounding back after a bad defeat, the Times says: "No reverse, it seems, can ruffle his equanimity or shake his nerves."

There are some laments for Great Britain's downfall. These were all the more sorrowful in view of the fact that the Ryder cup success had raised hopes of a British victory in the open for the first time since 1923.

"Without avoiding the new triumph Hagen so thoroughly deserved," the Post raises its grateful voice to come to the conclusion that British golfers "lack something that makes for victory."

Most of the Americans were in Edinburgh and St. Andrews today. Tomorrow members of the Ryder cup team go to Glenageary, Monday to Manchester and Tuesday to Leeds for the matches.

24,500 Boxing Fans Disagree With Decision

 CHICAGO, May 11 (AP)—Chicagoans gave evidence that Paddy Harrigan's big building, the Chicago stadium, will be a success, at least for boxing, last night, when 24,500 spectators filled the monster arena to witness Tony Canzoneri, former featherweight champion, grab an unpopular decision over Andre Rontis, present titleholder.

The crowd was the largest that ever witnessed an indoor boxing show in America. The gate receipts, at popular prices, amounted to around \$39,000.

His Decision
 The decision of Referee Eddie Puddy and the two judges, which was unanimous, was greeted with boos and hisses. The spectators believed Rontis was entitled to at least a draw.

Rontis' championship was not at stake because both fought above the 126-pound limit.

Rontis, a dynamic package of courage and fists, made Canzoneri retreat under a smashing two-fist body attack. He always came charging in, whaling away at the body at close quarters. He carried the fight to Canzoneri, but the judges evidently were impressed with Canzoneri's boxing skill in reaching their decision.

Armando Santiago knocked out Dick "Honey Boy" Finnegan, the Boston junior lightweight in the sixth round.
