## Local Churches' Sunday Services To Honor Mother

Special Music, Appropriate Sermons, Special Awards to be Included in Observance.

Mothers will be honored tomorrow in practically every church in the city. Almost every one has made arrangements for a special program or at least for special numbers in honor of mothers.

Special Mother's day services will also be held in some of the Sunday schools.

Most of the churches are now beginning their evening services at 8 o'clock instead of 7:30.

Central Church of Christ. Special Mother's day services will be held both in the Bible school and during the morning worship. Bible school meets at 9:45 a. m. Special recognition of mothers with awards to the oldest mother, the youngest mother, the youngest grandmother, the mother with the largest family and with most of the family present and the youngest baby present have been announced.

Morning worship begins at 11 a. m. Mother's day music will be furnished by the choir and the pastor's sermon will be on "Mother."

Evening worship is at 8 p. m. The song service will be assisted by the young people's choir and orchestra. The sermon subject will be "What of the Home?"

Christian Endeavor meets at 7 p. m. English Lutheran Church. Mother's day will be fittingly observed in sermon and song. The pastor will preach the sermon on the subject, "The Divine in Mother Love." The choir will render the anthem, "O Mother of Mine." Children will be received in baptism at this time.

The Sunday school will also observe Mother's day in the opening service. The message will be on "The Greatest Thing in the World," and the special song number "What a Friend We Have in Mother."

First Presbyterian Church. "A stained-glass window of rich beauty is found in a large church in the Empire state, which bears as its only inscription: 'To a Sainted Mother.' This is pure eloquence.
