Closing Irregular In Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, May 11 (AP)—Heavy weekend profit taking turned the course of prices irregular today, after an early display of strength. Selling pressure was most effective in the aviation, communications, motor and merchandising groups, while the public utilities, chemicals, amusements, oils and rails presented several points of strength. General Electric, Gillette, Safety Razor, International Telephone and Curtis Aeroplane all sold down 2 points or more, and at least a score others dropped 1 to 2 1/2 points below yesterday's final quotation in the last hour of trading.

The closing was irregular. Total sales approximated 1,800,000 shares.

Butter and Egg Prices Go Higher In Portland Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., May 11 (AP)—Butter and egg prices combined for a general advance today.

All grades of butter went up one cent. The advance was said to be the result of an effort to end premium paying by certain dealers.

Extra eggs went up half a cent to 29¢. Current receipts leaped 1 1/2 cents to 28¢, medium firsts and medium extras were unchanged.

Butterfat advanced one cent all along the line.

Poultry and veal are firm and in big demand. Medium sized items in particular are unusually scarce. The weekend shopping is expected to clean up available poultry and veal supplies.

Cauliflower is cleaned out. Asparagus is cheaper. Strawberries are selling at 15 and 20 a box retail.

Wheat Irregular In Chicago Today

CHICAGO, May 11 (AP)—Opening at 1/2¢ decline to 1/2¢ advance. Chicago wheat later showed gains all around. Corn and oats also developed a rising trend, with corn starting 1/2¢ off to 1/2¢ up, and subsequently scoring a general advance. Provisions held steady.

Wheat closed irregular, 1-1/2¢ net decline to an equal advance, corn 1-1/2¢ 1/2¢ off, oats unchanged to 1/2¢ down, and provisions at 10¢ set back to 10¢ gals.

Department of Agriculture—Hogs: 5,000; including 4,500 direct, market slow, mostly steady; top \$11.50 paid for around 215 pound weights; choice around 54¢ pound average at \$10.65; shippers 50¢ estimated holdover 2,000; butchers medium to choice 250-300 pounds \$10.40-11.00; 200-250 pounds \$10.50-11.20; 150-200 pounds \$10.50-11.25; 100-150 pounds \$10.75-11.25 nominal.				

Cattle 200; compared with a week ago fed steers and yearlings steady to 25 cents higher; better grades light and medium weights fed steers showing most advance, and week ending regained at close quite demand active at finish.

Vealers \$2.00-2.50 lower; a top of \$15.00 paid for fed steers, weighing 1,000 pounds to 1,457 pounds, mixed yearlings \$14.90; better yearlings \$14.75; most fed steers and yearlings \$13.00-14.25; bulk highly finished grain fed brought \$14.50 upward; run mostly fat steers of strong hind leg weights; numerous loads \$11.50 to 17.00 pounders hard to sell at \$12.25-14.50.
