Union County P-T Associations Meet At Island City

When the Union City Council of Parent-Teacher Association met in an all-day session Saturday, May 11 at the Island City community church, two resolutions were made. The first was that the Union City Council go on record as favoring all law enforcement, especially of the prohibition laws and the other that the council go on record as favoring the county library. The committee to work with other organizations toward the enforcement of prohibition laws consists of Mrs. George Lyman, chairman, Mrs. I. Paul, La Grande, Mrs. John Schroeder, Island City, Mrs. Henry Maxwell, Pendleton, Mrs. W. Conner, North Powder, Mrs. T. W. Bates, Willowsdale, is chairman of the committee which has as its work an educational program to regain the county library. Members of this committee are Mrs. Isaac Shafer of Island City, Mrs. C. W. Cleaver, Imbler, Mrs. E. D. Towler, La Grande, Mrs. H. H. Parker, North Powder and W. P. Brock, Summerville.

Mrs. George A. Bean lead the community singing at the beginning of both the morning and afternoon sessions. The theme of the afternoon meeting was "Adult Education." Miss Mabel Doby of the La Grande public library spoke very entertainingly and instructively on this subject. She gave as agencies which might contribute correspondents, school study groups, "read-a-book-together" groups, extension courses from the University of Oregon and the Oregon State college, as well as other schools, Eastern Oregon Normal school, radio, United States department of education, public libraries (the traveling library, the La Grande library and the state library at Salem).

A round table discussion followed at which many problems were discussed. The officers elected at the morning session were installed in the afternoon. Mrs. George Lyman, of La Grande, retiring president acting as installing officer. These were, president, Mrs. H. H. Parker, La Grande; first vice president, Mrs. George A. Bean, La Grande; second vice president, Mrs. A. S. Beyer, county school superintendent; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Henry Maxwell, Pendleton. These were installed during the afternoon, the retiring president, Mrs. George Lyman serving as installing officer. In the absence of the newly elected president, Mrs. George A. Bean, first vice president, spoke in behalf of the officers.

The members of the Island City association were the hostesses during the day and they proved to be most cordial and hospitable to hostesses. Mrs. Roberts of May Park was chairman of the kitchen committee, Mrs. Isaac Shafer, chairman of the dining room committee and Mrs. Leslie, chairman of the receiving committee.
