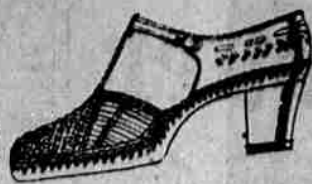

GLENNA COLLETT TRIUMPHS AGAIN

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 14 (AP)—Glenna Collett, American champion, advanced to the third round of the British women's golf championship today by defeating Miss Maude Bryant, of the Ashford Manor club, near London, 3 and 2.

Uhle Wins Sixth Game Of Season; Trims Old Team

By Herbert W. Barker (Associated Press Sports Writer) If you don't believe the old saying about the benefits of a change in scenery consider the case of George Uhle, now throwing up his right hand slants for Buck Harris' Detroit Tigers.

For ten years Uhle did all his work for the Cleveland Indians and very good work it was for the first eight of them. After a sensational season in 1924 when he won 27 games and lost eleven, Uhle slid back in alarming fashion. He won only eight games against nine defeats in 1927 and only 12 against 15 reverses last season.

Six Victories This Year

Under Hugh Harris' soothing influence at Detroit, Uhle has come back with a bang this year. Beating the Philadelphia Athletics, 5 to 3, yesterday Uhle chalked up his sixth victory without a defeat, the best record in either major league. The funeral services for D. M. Hoots were held at the Cook Brothers chapel Tuesday afternoon with Rev. R. C. Lee in charge of the service. Interment was made in the Union cemetery, the local Odd Fellows giving a short ceremony at the grave. D. M. Hoots was born in Green county, Illinois, in 1847. He came to Oregon in 1905 and five years later moved to Union and had lived here for the past nineteen years. He passed away at his home in North Union May 5 following a long illness. He leaves besides the widow, a daughter, Mrs. Kate Bartlett, of La Grande, two sons, Ephraim and Douglas, of Elmer, Illinois, and other relatives.
