Rain In Canada Turns Price Down

CHICAGO, May 14 (AP)—Snow and rain in Canada affording relief from shortage of moisture brought about early downturns today in wheat prices here. Auspicious domestic wheat crop reports and Liverpool quotations lower than due counted also as a bear influence. Opening at 1/2 to 3/4 decline. Chicago wheat afterward held near to the initial range. Corn and oats displayed considerable strength, with corn starting unchanged to 1/4 higher, and sub-

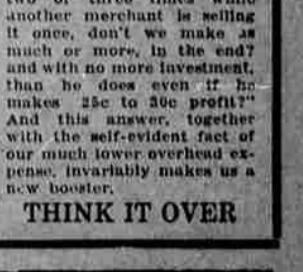
quently scoring an all around advance. Provisions inclined downward.

Wheat closed firm & to 1-1/4 3/4 net higher, corn 3/4 to 1 1/4 up, oats 3/4 to 1/2 advance and provisions unchanged to a setback of 20 cents.
