Robins Lose Eighth Straight—Athletics Continue to Lead Yanks.

Back at the Polo grounds, he saw the Reds skin away with the remains of a two-game series by a score of 12 to 8.

Robins Lose Again With Ducky Vance III. Glenn Wright on his way home and Burleigh Grimes in the box for Pittsburgh, the Robins found a perfect setting for their eighth straight defeat. Babe Herman's homer off Grimes in the fifth with two Robins on base lifted the score at 4 to 1.

Athletics Keep Lead The Yankees and the Athletics wound up their respective campaigns in the west with a defeat each and remained in a close grapple for the lead. The Maeks head the champions by half a game, but the Browns are only one full game from the top. In a virtual tie with the Amazing Pirates, Harry Hollman butted himself into insensibility against a ball held in the iron paw of Mickey Cochrane in the ninth inning at Detroit yesterday, but sprang across the plate with the winning run.

The Yankees put the Indians to no such extreme in the finale at Cleveland, contenting themselves with Lou Gehrig's eighth home run as the Tribe pounded George Pipgras and three other Yank slammers to win by 7 to 1.

Hagen Beaten By Geo. Duncan In First Round

MOORETOWN, Eng. May 16 (AP)—Walter Hagen, American Ryder Cup captain and four-times holder of the British open title, was beaten in the first round of the Yorkshire Evening News thousand guineas golf tournament by George Duncan, of Great Britain, today. Duncan, who headed the British Ryder Cup team that conquered the American squad here a fortnight ago, downed Hagen one up. Duncan sank a 40-foot putt at the hole to beat the American star for the second time. He defeated Hagen by an overwhelming score in the Ryder cup matches. Jose Jurado, of Argentina, was beaten by W. T. Twine, Great Britain, three and two.

STRANGLER LEWIS WINS WILMINGTON, Cal., May 16 (AP)—Dick Daviscourt, heavy-weight wrestler from Kansas, was unable to continue after being thrown out of the ring by Ed "Strangler" Lewis in a wrestling match here last night. Daviscourt, who claimed a head injury, was thrown in a backward head slam which resulted in Lewis being awarded the match. The fall, the only one of the match, was obtained by Lewis after one hour and eight minutes of furious wrestling.

RECORDS BROKEN EVERY SEASON

Four Sprinters Have Eyes on 100-yard Dash—Field Marks Improve. Then, Not one has weathered the gale since 1899. Only on the 9 3-5 for the "100," first officially made by Dan Kelly in 1906, has remained for over 20 years. Only two others, Ted Meredith's 440-yard mark of 47 2-5 and Pat Ryan's hammer throw record of 159 feet 6 1-2 inches, have lasted more than 10 years. Most of the marks—in fact, 11 out of the 15—have been topped within the past five years.
