## MENUS

**By Sister Mary**  
At this season of the year, the tang of horseradish has an excellent tonic effect.

Horseradish with roast beef is a time honored combination, but a touch of this same piquant root with oval adds much to the milder flavored meat.

Many vegetables gain interest by the addition of a small quantity of horseradish in the seasoning.

Broiled and broiled fish are improved if served with a horseradish sauce. The sauce may be hot or cold as preferred.

Horseradish cream has some food value in its sauce and adds about 1250 calories to the meal in which it is served.

**Horseradish Cream**  
Two cups cream, 2 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/4 cup grated horseradish, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar.

Melt butter, stir in flour and when perfectly blended, slowly add cream, stirring constantly. Cook two or three minutes after all the cream is added. Add remaining ingredients and keep hot over hot water but do not let boil.

Prepared horseradish can be used. Four tablespoons prepared horseradish are needed.

The sauce is good with roast beef or broiled fish.

Horseradish butter is exceptionally good with broiled fish. One of the "lean" varieties such as cod, haddock or halibut is desired.

**Horseradish Butter**  
One-half cup butter, 2 tablespoons grated horseradish, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon sugar.

Mix horseradish, salt, sugar and lemon juice. There should be enough lemon juice to make the horseradish moist but not thin. Work butter with a fork until creamy. Beat in horseradish mixture and continue beating until thick and white.

## New Postoffice in Baker County

BAKER, Ore., May 17—The Arthur postoffice, located at the Oregon Copper company properties 25 miles east of Baker, was opened Wednesday with Edward Hendrickson as acting postmaster, officials at the local postoffice announced.

The town of Arthur was named in honor of John Arthur, known as the "father of the Eastern Oregon copper belt."

The postoffice department has called for applications for the postmastership at Herchal, the site of the old Baker White Pine Lumber company camp, which was closed when the lumber company went into receivership. The postoffice is to be re-opened because of the resumption of activity at the camp.
