AT THE THEATERS

Tom Mix, Here in
"Outlawed,"
Has High Ideals

During all of his years on the
screen Tom Mix, the world's most
famous film star and the ideal of
youth everywhere, has made it an
inflexible rule to be shown smoking
a cigarette or taking a drink of li-
quor in any of his pictures, much
as cigarettes and drinking are con-
sidered part of the "western" and
cowboy atmosphere.

The reason behind this unusual
attitude of the "ace" of cowboy
stars, who is now presented in a
western feature, "Outlawed," at
the Colonial theater, is that he does
not desire to show an example of
questionable habits to his millions
of boy admirers. And just recently
this rule cost Tom several thou-
sands of dollars, according to a
story circulated in Hollywood.

It is to the effect that he re-
ceived an offer from a cigarette
company of a sum running well up
into the thousands for merely af-
fixing his name in newspapers and
on billboards, with Mix's smiling
likeness surmounted by his fami-
liar five-gallon hat.

But Tom declined the offer—
whether with thanks is not stated—
and tossed away the thousands of
dollars in order that he might
make good on the principle he
had established in that regard.

Emil Jannings
Is Star in "Sins
of the Fathers"

Reverting to his own national-
ity for the first time since his origi-
nal American-made picture, "Sins
of the Fathers," now at the Star
theater. The current production
is Jannings' fifth picture in this
country and in it he takes the role
of an American of German ex-
traction, his actual status.

In "The Way of All Flesh," in
which Jannings first appeared af-
ter he came to Hollywood, he played
the role of a German-American.
In "The Street of Sin" he was a
bully of the Limehouse district in
London. In his last two pictures,
"The Last Command," and "The
Patriot," he has been a Russian,
a grand duke in the former, and a
Czar in the latter.

Jannings was born in Brooklyn,
New York, but when he was a
year old, he was taken to Germany
with his parents and he remained
there until he came to Hollywood
as an established motion picture
star.

Ludwig Berger, who climbed the
ladder of film directorial fame in
Germany, directed Jannings in
"Sins of the Fathers." The careers
of the two run strangely parallel
in Germany, but this is the first
time they have worked together.
When Jannings started in pictures,
Berger was directing speaking
stage and operatic productions.
