

### BRAVES CONTINUE TO GATHER WINS

#### Clan McGraw Turned Back Twice Yesterday—Cards Gain a Notch.

By William J. Chipman (Associated Press Sports Writer) If the Braves stay up there another month, they may begin to believe that they belong in the first four. At any event, Emil Fuchs seems to have taught the Tribe the first principle a team must absorb to escape from the second division—the gentle art of winning the one-run games instead of losing them. His warriors added to the woes of John McGraw yesterday by shutting the Giants 4 to 3 and 5 to 4, in a back bay double-header.

What is more significant, the Braves twice came from behind to nose out McGraw's ambitious seventh pitcher, against the formidable Larry Benton in the opener and against no-hit Carl Hubbell in the tenth round of the afternoon.

#### Young Bruce Cunningham, the Pacific coast boy sent along by the Cubs as a sort of good measure offering in the Hornady deal, made his first major league start in the opening game, and refused to be dismayed by his illustrious opponent.

Art Delaney had charge of the Boston firing in the second clash, and turned in as fine a game as he has shown since his arrival in the majors.

The Cardinals slipped ahead of the Jolie Cubs into the league lead by outlasting Pittsburgh in a croaky ten round melee at Forbes field. The champions scored one run in the ninth and another in the tenth to pull out the decision by 19 to 5. Almost everybody except Donie Bush and Bill Southworth pitched, and Jim Bottomley hit two home runs.

The Robins rounded out the National league program in their customary manner, losing their ninth straight to the Phillies, 7 to 4. The only unusual item connected with this statement is that Doney Vance was on the firing line for Brooklyn.

The dapper was outpitched by Claude (Weeping) Willoughby, who has specialized in outpitching his opponents this spring. The Cubs and the Reds were idle yesterday.

#### Junior League Games

While the acknowledged contenders in the American league played along the exhibition trail yesterday, the Browns and the Tigers improved their standing by turning back western opponents. Alvin Crowder shaded Walter Miller by 1 to 0 in a pitching duel at St. Louis while Owen Carroll turned in a fine game to defeat Al Thomas and the White Sox by 4 to 3 at Detroit.

### Turnesa Only American Left In Golf Tourney

MOORTOWN, Eng. May 17 (AP)—An American and British professional will contest in the 18 hole finals of the Yorkshire Evening News thousand guinea golf tournament tomorrow. Joe Turnesa, New York, defeated Charles Whitcombe, two up, in the semi-finals today and will meet H. C. Jolly, who won from W. H. Davies, one up.

MOORTOWN, May 17 (AP)—Play in the thousand guinea professional golf tournament reached the semi-final round this morning with Joe Turnesa, of New York, the sole American surviving for the semi-finals this afternoon. Turnesa played in brilliant fashion to trounce J. J. Taylor, of Great Britain, 5 and 4, but Leo Diegel, the second American, here, was beaten by Charles Whitecombe, British Ryder Cup star, 2 and 1.

In the British half of the quarter finals, George Duncan, who eliminated Walter Hagen in the first round yesterday, was beaten by W. H. Davies, one up.

Herbert C. Jolly, Great Britain, outlasted Archie Compston in a long drawn out battle, winning one up at the 21st hole.

In the semi-finals this afternoon, Turnesa was matched with Whitecombe and Jolly with Davies.

### Miss Wethered Defeats Glenna At St. Andrews

ST. ANDREWS, May 17 (AP)—Joyce Wethered won the British women's golf championship today for the fourth time, defeating Glenna Collet, three times American champion, in the final at 35 holes. The American pined up a big lead on the first nine and was two up at the end of the first 15, but could not combat the steady play of her opponent in the afternoon.

The British girl's margin of victory was three up and one to play. The match ended when Miss Wethered won the 15th hole. The American girl started home with a pair of threes, reducing her opponent's margin from four up to two up but she was not able to reduce it more during the final eight holes.
