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### GIANTS, DODGERS IN CELLAR FIGHT

#### Cubs Maintain Hold on First Place—Athletics Win in Junior League.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 21 (AP)—The faces which apparently have decreed that no Mexican shall hold a world's ring title have denied another challenge from that Latin-American race.

To the futile attempts of Aurelio Herrera and Joe Livera, great Mexican fighters, to ascend fistic thrones, there was added another today, that of Baby Sam Sorio, boy-ish San Bernardino, Cal., ringman. Sorio's quest for the junior lightweight crown was decisively repulsed here last night by Ted Morgan, slim, elusive king of that division. Morgan won by a wide margin from the 19 year old Mexican who had flattened some 55 of his 75 opponents. The title holder romped off with eight of the ten rounds.

Baby Sam's challenge was plotted to shreds by the jabbing, slashing left hand of the champion, against which he had absolutely no defense. Morgan's long left jab found its way to Sorio's head and body repeatedly keeping the Mexican's head tilted back and his weight balancing on his heels. When Sorio tried to fire his short, polting rights, he found that great swaption, pulled attention to his side, by the ringer Morgan.

In two rounds, however, Baby Sam saw realization of his hopes almost come true. He took the third and eighth sessions, and had the champion in distress in both. In the third he nailed Morgan with several lefts and jarring rights and Ted went down. The champion, claiming a foul, weathered the storm, however. Again in the eighth Baby Sam had the titleholder in distress as the result of three more of his six inch rights.

However, it was plainly a case of too much experience, too much ring generalship, and too much boxing skill for the youthful, swarthy skinned challenger.
