Pour the cranberry mixture around them and bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) 20 minutes until the bananas are tender.

PARIS, May 21 (AP)—The experts of the creditor nations were reported in French unofficial circles today to have "reached an accord in principle" on the question of the reparation of reparation annuities among themselves except for a number of small points in the language to be used in their report on the matter. The report could not be confirmed, but it was known that great progress had been made in the past two days. According to the French version, the answer of the creditor experts to the reservations made by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, head of the German delegation, probably will be made known to the Germans tomorrow.
