KOHLER, EDVALSON COWS HIGH DURING THE MONTH OF APRIL

The two high cows for the month of April in the Union county Dairy Herd Improvement association were those of Ernest Kohler and C. P. Edvalson, according to the recent report of Hans Seltors, official tester. Mr. Kohler's "Star" produced 954 pounds of milk and 61.1 pounds of butterfat, while Mr. Edvalson's grade Holstein "Jane" produced 1559 pounds of milk with 53.4 pounds of butterfat.

There were 55 herds tested for the month in which 554 cows were enrolled, and of this number 57 were dry. The total production of the 55 herds was 316248 pounds of milk, with 18881.0 pounds of butterfat. There were 92 40-pound cows. The average production of

milk was 538.9 pounds and of butterfat, 24.9 pounds.

Walter Vogel had the high herd in the group of over 20 head. His 22 head of grade Jerseys and Holsteins averaged 857.5 pounds of milk, 40.5 pounds of butterfat. In the division of 12-20 head, S. A. Robertson's 12 grade Jersey's and Holsteins produced an average of 550.2 pounds of milk and 38.3 pounds of butterfat. In the third class, those having less than 12 head, the nine grade Jersey's of W. W. Langford had an average of 881.7 pounds of milk with 43.2 pounds of butterfat.

One half pound beef suet.
One half pound bread crumbs.
One half cup currants.
Three eggs.
Four tablespoons sugar.
One tablespoon flour.
One half teaspoon grated lemon peel.

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Fine Cattle To Be Exhibited At Livestock Show

Fine dairy cattle from all of the fertile valleys of Eastern Oregon and Idaho will vie for prizes at the Eastern Oregon Stock Show, to be held at Union June 5, 6, and 7, according to present information.
