MENUS

Most housewives welcome new potatoes in the spring as a relief from the old ones which have lost much through long storage. However, beware of urine or immature potatoes. Their starch grains have not reached maturity and are difficult to digest so children should not be given new potatoes while the skin is easily scraped off.

New potatoes are richer in vitamin C than those which have been stored through the winter months. All vegetables lost some of this vitamin during a long period of storage, potatoes to a lesser degree than many other vegetables. Whenever it's at all possible, potatoes should be cooked in their "jackets." Baked potatoes are the most desirable since the intense heat of baking makes them easily digested and the mineral content is preserved. Steamed potatoes come next in

the scale of desirability. None of the ash constituents are lost in the water as in boiling. Potatoes do not lose their color during steaming as the green vegetables do, so there is no drawback to this method.

As with all other vegetables, care should be taken that potatoes are not overcooked. Too often the good of potatoes is cooked away and the mineral matter thrown down the sink, leaving only a source of bulk and a carrier for fat as the value of the vegetable when it appears on the table.

This season of the year, potatoes are sold generally by the pound. There are about three potatoes to a pound and this amount will make about two cups of mashed potato or two cups of diced potato. One pound of potatoes will serve four persons.

Although macaroni, spaghetti, rice and noodles are often used as potato substitutes, they are not true substitutes. Potatoes furnish mineral salts and vitamins as well as starch, while the other articles are really refined cereals and lacking in the valuable nutrients found in the potato.

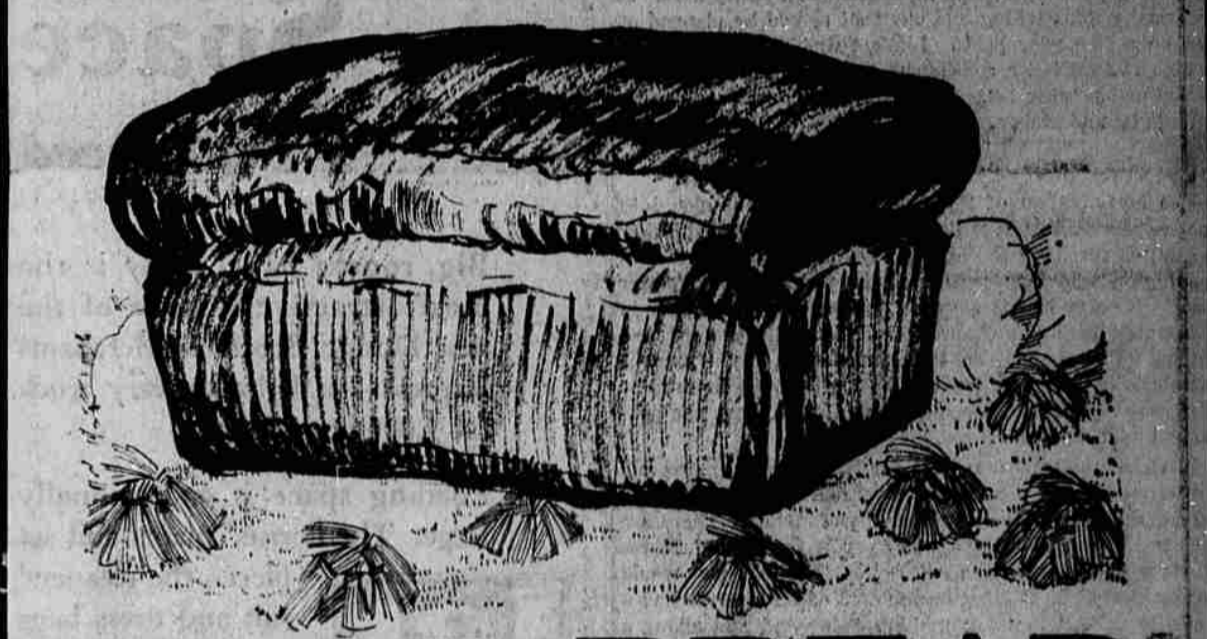
