

LEAGUE LEADERS CHALK UP WINS

Missions Defeat Oakland 17 to 6 and Los Angeles Sinks Ducks.

By the Associated Press.—Constant baseball looked like itself yesterday with the eight clubs functioning at top speed and providing plenty of thrills. With resumption of the week's activities on all fronts, league leaders with only one exception forged ahead another notch in the race for the 1929 honors.

Oakland twirlers were easy marks for the batsmen of the Mission Reds at Recreation park, and the Killeferman ran away with the game by a score of 17 to 6.

Los Angeles pounded the ball like mad and won easily from Portland 9 to 5. After the Angels got started in the fourth inning, it was easy sailing, despite the wild pitching of Boehler. In the second, the visitors in the northern city tied the score with two runs. In the sixth they added four more, and the closing innings yielded another three.

At Los Angeles, the Hollywood Stars routed Max Baucus and Lotty Flynn hard to win an 11 to 5 victory over Sacramento. The Stars put away a five run lead in the first three innings, but the Solons drove Johns to cover with a three-run rally in the fourth and tied the score in the sixth off Murty. However, Flynn wobbled in the next two frames, permitting Hollywood to pile up five more tallies.

The San Francisco Seals playing at Seattle, were the only club of the three leaders to drop a game yesterday. The Indians won by a score of 6 to 5. Podre base running in the eighth inning by Holtz Thurston was blamed for the defeat.

The knockout was the first of the season for French in a starting game, and the defeat was only his second.
