Closing Weak; Prices Down And Up During Day

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—Acute weakness developed in today's stock market as a result of the federal reserve council's statement that it favored an increase from 5 to 6 per cent in rediscount rates. Prices sold off sharply at the opening, rallied before midday under the leadership of oils on the announcement that President Hoover had called a conference of western governors to set on oil conservation plans and then turned weak again in the early afternoon. Extreme declines of 3 to 15 points were distributed over a broad list of railroad and industrial shares.

Trading slackened and the market showed more stability after the call loan rate was reduced to 2 per cent. Radio mounted to above 95 and Case Threshing Machine recovered 8 points, while Auburn was down 2, to 25 1/2. The closing was weak. Sales approximated 4,300,000 shares.

Few Changes Today In Market Prices

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22 (AP)—A decline of one cent to 44 cents in butter extras and an advance of half a cent to 25 1/2 in medium first eggs were the only changes recorded in products today.

Supplier of poultry and dressed meats were reasonable, but prices held steady.

Receipts of seasonable fruits and vegetables were becoming larger as the periods in prices have taken place.

Lettuce and cabbage were somewhat easier, while rhubarb was firmer.

BELANGER IS GIVEN NOD IN PORTLAND GO

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22 (AP)—Charley Belanger, Winnipeg light heavyweight, took a ten-round decision over K. O. White, Chicago here last night. White's best round was the fourth when he launched a heavy barrage. There were no knockdowns and the tenth round was the best of the fight, Belanger cornered White twice, but the negro refused to go down and fought his way out of trouble.

Eddie Thomas, Bellingham, won the six-round semi-windup from Ralph Smith, Tacoma.

The best preliminary was the four smashing rounds between Roy Crest, San Francisco, and Billy Robbins, Portland, which went to a draw.

Kid Rocco, Walla Walla, knocked out Brownie Buskirk, Athena, Ore., in the second round, after dropping Buskirk twice for the count of nine. Bobby Verano, Vancouver, ash., defeated Johnny Rees, Walla Walla, four rounds, in the curtain raiser. Earl Forme, San Diego, won a technical knockout over Young Battling Nelson, Walla Walla, the referee stopping it in the third.

Weakness of wheat quotations at Liverpool, together with continued favorable domestic crop reports, acted as a bearish influence. Opening 1/2 to 1 1/2 off, Chicago wheat later held near to the initial range. Owing largely to better weather for field work, corn also was weak, starting 1/2 to 1 1/2 down, and afterward steadying somewhat. Oats were easy. Provisions showed firmness.
