Indians Defeat Seals While Ducks Lose Third Straight to Los Angeles.

Big Bill Tilden Defeats Wetzel In Paris Match

PARIS, May 24 (AP)—William T. (Big Bill) Tilden scored a quick victory 6-1, 6-1, 6-1 over Herr Wetzel, German player, in the first singles match of the international hard court tennis championships today.

It was a scorchingly hot day and there were exactly seven spectators sitting in the sun-baked uncovered stands to watch the former American and world's champion perform. Tilden played grimly with tremendous force and speed and disposed of Wetzel, who is reputed to be one of Germany's most promising players, in just 27 minutes. The German player won two games on his own service and broke through Tilden's service once when the latter double faulted attempting to get more spin on the ball.

Francis T. Hunter also swept through the first round defeating Signor Deo Bono of Italy 6-1, 6-4, 6-0.
