THE GARDEN

Early crop tomato plants should now be set in the ground. An excellent place to put them is between the rows of beans so when the pea patch has done its duty the vines can be pulled up and behold a quick change into a tomato patch. Set at stakes with the tomato plants. The stakes will save you away from stepping on the tomato plants while you are picking the peas and will be needed before the pea crop is out of the way to start the tomato on its upward career.

No up to date gardener wastes tomatoes by letting the vines lie on a tangled mass on the ground nowadays. He knows that better fruit and more of it is obtained by growing the tomato upright where the sun will have a full shot at the fruit so that it will ripen evenly. Lush, trailing vines also give a chance to pick out superfluous growth and force the strength of the plant into producing tomatoes.

One main stem and two side stems are the most that should be permitted to develop and these should be tied as they progress until they reach the top of the stake which should be five feet above ground. When the tomato reaches the top, pinch off the ends and throw the strength to the fruit. Two feet apart is as close as the vines should be set for convenience in cultivating and in harvesting the fruit.

When the vines lie in a tangled heap on the ground, fruit in contact with the soil is inclined to rot, especially if there is a spell of wet weather. The upright system of growth also makes it an easy

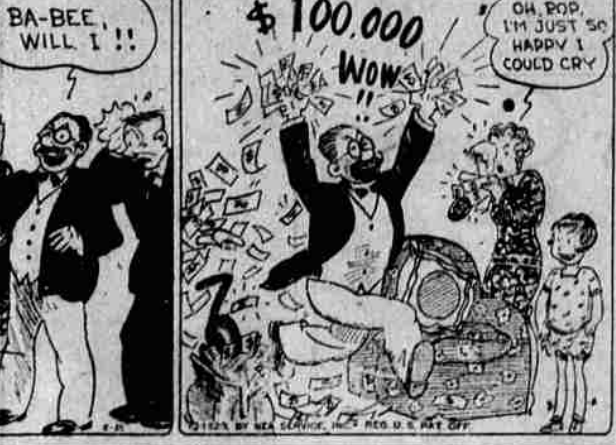
