Big Bill Tilden To Retire From Overseas Play

NEW YORK, May 25 (AP)—Big Bill Tilden will retire from international tennis competition after 10 years of overseas play. The 33-year-old Tilden, who has won 10 Grand Slam titles, will retire after the Wimbledon tournament in London. Tilden has won the Wimbledon title five times, the U.S. National title three times, and the Australian title once. He has also won the Davis Cup five times. Tilden is considered one of the greatest tennis players of all time.

Tilden hopes to fill in his time with tennis exhibitions, which start next week with newspaper articles. He has no intention of retiring from tennis, but he will stop competing in international tournaments. Tilden is currently ranked as the world number one tennis player.

PARIS, May 25 (AP)—Bill Tilden and Frank Hunter lost their first 1929 tennis match today, losing to Jean Borotra and Rene Lacoste in the semi-finals of the French tennis championships. 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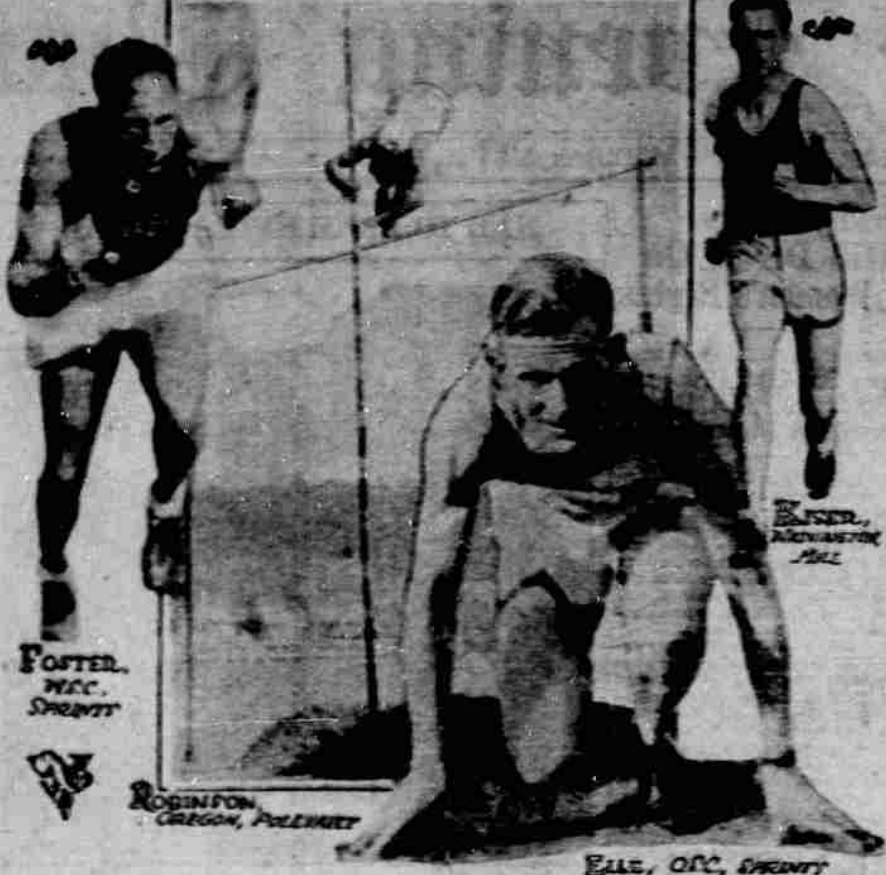
