Wheat Deliveries Drop in Chicago

CHICAGO, May 25 (AP)—All deliveries of wheat here dropped early today to a new low price record for the season. Rain in Canada and Argentina brought about increased selling and more than counterbalanced the effect of unexpected steadiness shown by wheat at Liverpool. Opening is in 1/4 lower. Chicago wheat values later recovered somewhat. Corn and oats tended also to decline, with corn starting unchanged to 1/2, off and later surging all around. Provisions were firm.

Wheat closed irregular, at 1/2 net decline to 1/2 advance, corn unchanged to 1/2 higher, oats 1/2 to 1/4 down, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 20 cents.

Eastern Oregon Churches Will Meet Here 1930

Christians, in Convention at Heppner, Elect R. L. Putnam to Succeed Self as Secretary.

The thirtieth annual convention of the Churches of Christ in Eastern Oregon was closed Thursday night at Heppner, with two addresses. E. V. Silvers spoke on the international convention to be held in Seattle, Aug. 8 to 14, inclusive, and R. L. Putnam, of La Grande, spoke on "The Mission of the Holy Spirit."

Officers were elected and it was decided to hold the 1930 convention in La Grande next May. Guy L. Drift, of Pendleton, was elected president to succeed himself and Mr. Putnam, was re-elected secretary. Mr. Drift will also be a member from Eastern Oregon on the state board.

The theme of the convention was "The Holy Spirit" and several very interesting addresses were made, including the following:

"The Holy Spirit in the Early Church," by O. W. Jones, formerly of La Grande but now of Bend.

"The Holy Spirit in the Early Church," by H. L. Ford, of Enterprise, also formerly of La Grande.

"Manifesting the Spirit of Pentecost," by O. L. Matlock, of Baker.

"The Holy Spirit in Church Today," by Wallace E. Jones, of Halfway.

Two other outstanding addresses were: "The Restoration Movement" by M. W. Bower, of Heppner, and "The Unfinished Task of the Restoration Movement," by C. E. Swander, of Portland, state secretary.

About 60 to 70 were in attendance including the Rev. and Mrs. R. L. Putnam and daughter, Wynona, and Mrs. L. M. Parker, of La Grande.

SMITH FILES APPEAL FROM BALLOT TITLE

SALEM, Ore., May 25 (AP) L. R. Smith of Portland, attorney for the Greater Oregon association, was here yesterday and filed appeal both in the circuit and the supreme courts from the ballot title prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle for the excise tax act referendum. It was filed in both courts for the reason that there is some question whether the supreme court has original jurisdiction in the case. In the circuit court Judge McMahon will be petitioned to stop the circulation of the referendum petitions until the case can be heard on its merits.

The persons backing the referendum must have the petitions completed on or before June 4.

Three Arrested Due to "Snitcher"

LOS ANGELES, May 25 (AP)—The "snitcher"—most feared foe of all gangland—today had played in the role of the law. He was arrested in connection with the slaying of two gangsters during a holdup of the Agnes Caliente and Tinsana company's money car near San Diego, May 25.

The robbers realized little more than \$3,000 in cash, since most of the \$53,000 week-end receipts from the recent was in non-negotiable checks. Captured last night, less than an hour apart, Eddie Cochran and Jerry Kosmary are under arrest because somebody "snitched." Two days after the holdup M. R. Colson, with a tell-tale shoulder wound was taken by San Diego police following a tip from an anonymous source.
