BIG TEN DROPS IOWA UNIVERSITY

Place Charges of Subsidizing Athletics—Students Egg Home of Ex-coach

IOWA CITY, Iowa, May 27 (AP)—The home of Paul E. Belting, resigned director of athletics at the University of Iowa, was egged during the night. One group of students organized last night for the purpose of burning up when Trank Coach George Broadbent and E. H. Lewis, who succeeded Belting, appealed to the students to refrain from any display of violence.

Student feeling against Belting was aroused following announcement that the University of Iowa had been expelled from the big ten conference on a charge of subsidizing athletics.

At the request of University of Iowa officials, Major John L. Griffith, big ten commissioner of athletics, will come to Iowa City this week to aid authorities in an investigation of the charges on the basis of which the western conference last Saturday severed athletic relations with the Hawkeye institution.

Allegations of a \$5,000 "slush fund" raised among Iowa City merchants in 1927 to aid Iowa athletes figured most prominently today in the discussion here of the conference changes presented at a secret meeting of the faculty committee Saturday.

The University of Iowa today set about to put its athletic house in order, following its ouster from the big ten conference, on charges of subsidizing athletics.

Jones Home Is Damaged By Fire Today At Noon

Examiner Reports Against Project

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—H. C. Davis, interstate commerce commission examiner, assigned to investigate one of the Western Pacific railroad projects, which contemplates the bringing into existence of 128 miles of new through route from a point near Fresno to Silergrad, Calif., declared today that it represented "inherently wasteful paralleling of existing railroads" and advised the commission to disallow it.

WHEAT DROPS TO BELOW \$1 PER BUSHEL

Rush to Unload Grain Drives Prices Down to Lowest in 14 Years.

WALL STREET IS ALSO IN TUMBLE

Several Conditions Cause Plunge in Values—Rain Falls in the Canadian Grain Belt.

CHICAGO, May 27 (AP)—A rush to unload grain today drove prices down to the lowest level of the season and brought May wheat on the Chicago board of trade below the dollar mark for the first time in six years. The close, at 95 1/2 c, was the lowest for May delivery in 14 years, and represented a drop of 2 1/2 c since Saturday.

STOCK MARKET BREAKS NEW YORK, May 27 (AP)—The stock market again broke wide open today, scores of issues tumbling \$2 to \$3 a share, many breaking through the low levels reached in last Wednesday's dramatic collapse. Predictions of a severe scarcity of money during the mid-year shifting of balances and another break in the wheat market, carrying prices below a \$1 a bushel for the first time in 15 years, caused the heavy selling.

LOWEST SINCE 1922

CHICAGO, May 27 (AP)—Wheat dropped to \$1.00 per bushel. Corn and rye had their new low-price records. Heavy rains in Canada were the chief factor depressing the market.

The drop from Saturday's low was only fractional. After sinking to \$1.00 1/4 for a low mark of the season Saturday, wheat had rebounded to finish at \$1.01 1/4. It was the first time wheat had dropped to the dollar mark in six years, and the lowest level recorded since July 1923 when wheat sold at \$1.00 1/4.

The market had to contend with weakness in Liverpool as well as rains in the Canadian grain belt and there was still the heavy carry-over from 1928 to dispose of while this year's harvest already has begun to compete for the market.

Teacher Killed In Centralia Wreck

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 27 (AP)—Miss Ida Sandquist, 26, high school teacher of Vancouver, Wash., was instantly killed, and H. W. Durose, of Hoquiam, was seriously injured yesterday when their automobile was struck by a Great Northern train. The couple had planned to be married this summer. The girl's head was severed from her body. Durose suffered spinal injuries and serious bruises. The automobile was dragged 165 feet by the train.

Enforcement Of Law Crisis Seen By Presbyterians

Condition Grave, 141st General Assembly is Told at St. Paul Today in Committee Report.

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 27 (AP)—That a crisis is faced with respect to enforcement of state and national laws in the United States was the message delivered today to the 141st general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America by one of its principle committees.

"To assist in bringing about 'proper respect for law,' the administrative committee of the church's general council recommended an elaborate plan of action including the creation of a special commission, but specifically stated that its intention is to maintain distinct separation of the functions of church and state and to make its influence felt morally rather than legislatively.

"While the church ought at all times to give the government its moral support, that duty instantly becomes more preeminent and exacting in a time of crisis," the assembly was told by the committee which then referred to the address of President Hoover at the Associated Press luncheon at New York in April, saying:

"When the president of the United States can say, in a carefully prepared public address, that in his opinion that what we are suffering from is no passing crime wave, but that it seems to him more like a subsidence of the very moral foundations upon which our republic rests, there should be no doubt in the mind of any one that the nation is facing a crisis as grave as any in our history. The American people have seldom, if ever, received a more weighty and solemn call to arouse itself and fight for its life than in this address of our chief executive. It is like 'fate knocking at the door.'"

"With this warning blast of the trumpet ringing in our ears, shall our church not prepare herself to battle? Shall we go on with our routine as if nothing unusual were happening? We cannot. We must give all help in our power."

"His recommendations for action provide for: Creation of a national loyalty commission of from 10 to 25 members headed by the moderator, Dr. Cleveland B. McAfee, of Chicago, on a similar plan as the church's
