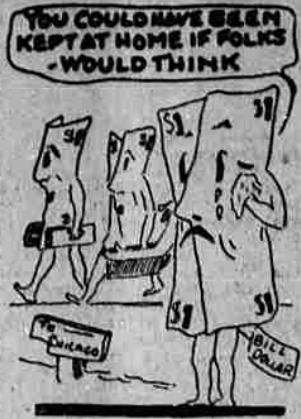

### Dance Pavilion Burns; Loss Is About \$3,500.00

T. M. and J. Q. Gilmore, owners of the Fontaine dance hall, about a mile and a half this side of Union, are at a loss to determine the origin of the fire which completely destroyed the dance pavilion Saturday night. There had been a dance there earlier in the evening, but it is asserted, every precaution had been taken with the fires in the two stoves and also the gasoline lights, before the building was closed for the night.

Fire was discovered shortly before midnight, but by the time of its discovery the building was a mass of flames and with no apparatus to fight it, nothing could be done to save anything of the building. Embers were still smoldering at noon yesterday.

The building was erected into last fall, was a rather commodious structure, quite substantially built. The loss is given today as \$3500 only partly covered by insurance. One of the E. O. L. & P. company's poles was burned down during the fire and a crew of workmen was immediately rushed to the scene from La Grande. The repairs were completed by 11:00 o'clock yesterday morning after several hours of continuous work. Service in La Grande was not interrupted.
