INFANT DEATH RATE IN STATE BEST IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Fewer babies in every 1,000 born alive died before reaching their first birthday during 1927 in Oregon than in any of the 48 states and the District of Columbia that made up the United States birth-registration area in that year, according to figures contained in the report of the administration of the maternity and infancy act for the fiscal year 1928, to be issued soon by the Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor. When Oregon was admitted to the area in 1919, 63 infants died under 1 year of age out of every 1,000 born alive. In 1921, the year before Oregon began cooperation under the maternity and infancy act, the rate was 51; in 1927 it had dropped to 45, the lowest point in the nine years the state had been in the registration area.

The material mortality rate in Oregon has also shown a downward trend, from 74.3 per 1,000 live births in 1921 to 63.6 in 1927.

HEALTH

DIGESTION By A. C. IVY, PH. D., Professor of Physiology, Northwestern University Medical School, Chicago, Illinois.

The digestive canal, which is composed of muscle fibers and glands, is connected with the brain (the master "house of the body") by nerves. The nervous conduct impulses, which affect the function of the muscle fibers, causing them to relax in some instances and to contract in others; also they affect the glands, causing them to secrete in some instances and to stop secreting in others. Obviously, then, the type of activity going on in the brain has a marked effect on digestion.

If the surroundings are pleasant, the food appetizing, and the frame of mind so that one can think of his food and enjoy it, the digestive organs function perfectly. If the surroundings are not pleasant, if one is worried and thinks of his work, or is anxious, the digestive organs do not function perfectly. Sleep increases the acidity of the stomach juice because of the inactivity of the brain. If a person

is hypnotized and told that he is eating a splendid meal, the stomach will secrete. When one is worried, or anxious, the muscles of the digestive canal does not work normally. Certain portions go into spasm and other portions do not move with normal vigor. Digestive disorders result.

Hunger is caused by vigorous movements of the stomach. One knows quite well that if he goes with food for six or twelve hours, he gets hungry. But if during this time he has been anxious or worried, he does not get hungry. He does not get hungry because the mental activity prevents the vigorous movements of the stomach. Hunger increases the rate of digestion and evacuation of the stomach. It is perfectly clear, then, that food should not be taken into the stomach when the stomach is in such a state that it cannot empty the food into the small intestine for the purpose of further digestion and absorption.

The nervous system is so constructed that habits can be formed. These habits may be good or bad. It is difficult to change habits. A bad eating habit produces chronic and vicious disorders of the digestive canal that are difficult to cure or to correct. The lesson, then, is that when one sits down to eat, he should form the good habit of disengaging from his mind those things that cause anxiety and worry. Teach yourself to be able to relax at will.

I urge that you think of your food and of pleasant but not exciting things while eating, that you eat lightly or easily digested food prior to and during a day fraught with business worry, mental or nervous strain and anxiety, and that you eat heartily only when a meal can be followed by several hours of leisure and relaxation, free from the nervous inhibitory impulses that deteriorate the formation of digestive juices and movements of the stomach and intestine.
