work in determining justification for rate changes, the bill proposes that it may consider differences in conditions of competition between domestic and foreign articles in the principal markets of the United States, instead of differences in cost of production as provided in the present law. Experience has proved that foreign production costs virtually are unobtainable.

**President's Authority**  
The president, in exercising his power under the flexible clause, which authorizes him to raise or lower rates as much as 50 per cent, would be allowed, if he deemed it necessary, to base rates on the American selling price or to reclassify articles in order to effect rate changes.

In addition, the executive would be authorized to investigate methods for basing import duties on some form of domestic valuation instead of foreign valuation as at present and report to congress. Here are some of the more important rate changes in the bill:

regarded as more important than the others. The duties placed on households in our city for the sale of other farm and factory products also will have a bearing on family budgets unless producers absorb the higher imposts instead of passing them on to the consumer.

**Gives Hoover Power**  
While the measure is understood to be objectionable in some respects to President Hoover, it means his request for a reorganization of the tariff commission by providing authority for him to terminate the terms of office of the present six commissioners at his will by the simple process of sending the names of their successors to the senate for its advice and consent.

The recreated commission would be composed of seven members, instead of six, and the president would be permitted to ignore political affiliations in making his appointments. Under existing law not more than three commissioners may be of the same political party. Salaries of the commissioners would be raised from \$7,500 to \$12,000 and their terms would be for seven years instead of twelve as at present. To speed up the commission's

**La Grande Women Face Charges In U. S. Court Today**

PORTLAND, May 28 (AP)—Pauline Hudson, 21, and Viola Matheny, of La Grande, were arraigned in federal court today charged with conspiracy to influence witnesses appearing before the federal grand jury. Both women are held in jail in default of \$2,000 bail. They pleaded not guilty and trial was set for July 11.

The women, with R. E. La Bonte, of La Grande, arrested Monday, are alleged to have offered \$500 to complaining witnesses in the case of C. R. Kingsley, of Walla Walla, charged with Mann act violations. Kingsley is under arrest here.

Kingsley, formerly of La Grande, was arrested some time ago near Pendleton. He is known here as "Pete" Kingsley.
