

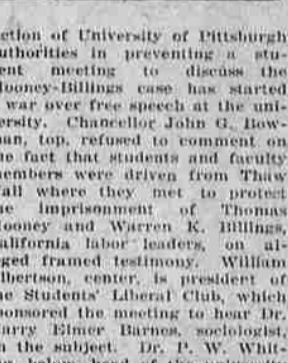
Local News in Brief

(Continued from Page 1) this year, is what its name implies—a place for training teachers for positions in high schools, normal schools and colleges, with special emphasis on the specialized fields of commerce, home economics, industrial arts, manual training, agricultural and the like.

In addition to the regular class work, Miss Kirby has taken part in campus affairs, being secretary of the students' co-operative board of directors, vice-president of the independent student council and on the educational exposition committee.

She is a member of the Waldo hall chapter and Terminus, organization of Eastern Star women. Miss Klopfenstein has also been active in campus affairs. She is vice president of Euterpe, honorary society in music, vice president of Madrigal club and financial manager of the Y. W. C. A. She is also a member of the rifle team.

PASS MONEY BILL

It was introduced at the request of Chicago financiers who argued that "loose money" in Chicago was being sent to New York where it could command a higher rate of interest.

NORRIS RESOLUTION REPORTED

WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)—The Norris resolution to provide for government operation of the Muscle Shoals property in Alabama was reported favorably to the senate today by its agriculture committee.

The report was made by the unanimous vote of the thirteen members present.

Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, author of the resolution, which is identical to that given a pocket veto by President Coolidge last year, announced, however, he was doubtful if the senate could act before the summer recess.

START HEARINGS JUNE 10 WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)

Chairman Smoot announced today the senate finance committee would start hearings on the house tariff bill about June 10, and that it would receive testimony of senators and representatives and persons who did not appear before the house ways and means committee on the measure.
