PITTSBURG TOPS NATIONAL LEAGUE

Pirates Trim Chicago 7 to 2—Philadelphia Athletics Win Again.

The corner charge has broken through into open territory with nothing in view to halt it. General McCarthy reformed broken Cubs lines near Forbes field today for a rear-guard action designed to prevent the Pirates from maintaining their advanced position, but the Chicago forces faced the necessity of winning both battles if they were to haul back the troops to Donohue.

The last cub line gave way at Pittsburgh yesterday under the pressure of Pirate bats and the blinding cross-bats of young Steve Swetonic, right hand recruit from Indianapolis. Swetonic threw him, self so wholeheartedly into his task of halting Pat Malone that he weakened in the eighth and had to allow Carmen Hill to finish the job. But that isn't half of what happened to Malone.

The Pirates assaulted the Chicago star with everything in their repertoire, reducing him to a shapeless hul in less than five innings when the Buccaneers won by 7 to 2, thereby moving into the league lead by a margin of one game over their rivals.

The defeat shoved the Cubs back into a virtual tie with the Cardinals, who watched two games from the Reds at St. Louis, 4 to 3 and 6 to 2. The Braves lead the league champions by a percentage margin because of having played fewer games.

Chase Dudley, sensational young candidate for a place beside Dazzy Vance, broke the winning streak of the Giants. Young Dudley did not entirely cut off the home run diet of the Giants, but he did cut a half after Dazzy Lindstrom, got one, and the Indians scored by 4 to 1.

Philadelphia Team Win
The Phillies, incurably addicted to mistreating the Braves, repeated yesterday by 12 to 2.

The best medicine for a Washington losing streak seems to be a game with the Yanks. Washington won by 5 to 4 yesterday.

The Athletics won their customary victory over the Red Sox, 7 to 1, behind George Barnshaw's smart pitching, and Connie Mack regained all the ground he had lost to Miller Huggins twenty-four hours earlier.

The Tigers halted the Browns by 7 to 6. George Uhl acted this opportunity to hang up his ninth successive victory of the season.

The Indians ambushed the White Sox in Chicago by 11 to 3 as Lew Fonseca hit two home runs and Little Rabbit Taxver, the Detroit exile, picked up one. Jimmy Zinn, a recruit, outpitched Al Thomas, and Grady Adkins by a wide margin.

TRACK RECORDS LIKELY TO FALL

Cream of Pacific Northwest Athletes Compete at Eugene Saturday.

EUGENE, Ore., May 30 (AP)—Four three-year-old records are likely to be bowled over before a thundering herd of athletes from six Pacific Northwest colleges and universities in the annual northern division Pacific coast conference track and field meet here tomorrow and Saturday. A fifth three-year mark is none too safe with several nationally known stars vying for honors in the conclaves.

All of the five marks were established in the conference meet at Palo Alto, Cal., in 1926. The quartet of records hoped to be shattered are the 440 yard, one mile and two mile runs and the 1500 yard. The other figure which may take the count is the shot put mark of 50 feet 3 1/2 inches made by Bud Houser of Southern California. Paul Jessup, the University of Washington's bean pole weight man, tossed the heavy ball 50 feet 2 1/2 inches last Saturday in a dual meet with Washington State college and has his eye set on the conference mark.

Moeller Favored
Ed Moeller, giant Oregon weightman, is not only counted upon to break the conference mark of 154 feet 6 1/2 inches in discus, but is expected to possibly leave the platter to a new world's mark. Moeller broke the recognized world's record of 153 feet 1 1/2 inches made by Houser in 1926, when he hurled the disc 160 feet 7 1/4 inch in a dual meets with Washington this year. Moeller has several practice marks better than 160 feet.

The 440 yard record of 49 seconds flat was set by Miller of Stanford and was tied in 1927 by Ed Belter of Washington. Talbot Hartley, Washington cluster athlete, has turned the trick in 48 1/2 this season and will be shooting for a better mark in the P. C. C. meet.

Distance Records Menaced
The mile and two mile records of 4 minutes 21.7 seconds and 9 minutes 20.4 seconds, respectively established by Gillette of Montana, are figured to fall before the flying feet of Rufus Kiser and Bob Sellers, two Washington axes. Kiser is the national mile champion and has made 4:17.3 in competition this year, while Sellers has done 9:27.5.

Approximately 90 athletes—the cream of the Pacific northwest—are expected to compete in the annual affair from the Universities of Washington, Oregon, Montana and Idaho, and Washington and Oregon State colleges.

PORTLAND BOY IS SECOND IN COMPETITION

RALEIGH, Ore., May 30 (AP)—Jack Glover, 1067 Couch street, Portland, pupil in Laurelhurst school, is second prize winner in the nation-wide safety essay contest conducted by the highway education board for elementary school pupils, according to information received by C. A. Howard, state school superintendent. The honor is won in a competition in which over 600,000 pupils participated.

Young Glover was first prize winner in the Oregon state contest for 1927 and 1928, winning a gold medal and \$15 in cash. His second prize award in the national contest is a gold watch given by the
