Money Once Sent Out of La Grande Is Lost to This District Forever

WHAT KIND OF A
PLACE WOULD OUR CITY
BE IF EVERY ONE WERE
LIKE YOU?



"When money is sent out of town for goods that can be bought at home," said "Bill" Dollar, "that money with all of its possibilities is lost to this city forever. With some people, however, the thought is that when a dollar is sent out of town for goods that should be bought here, merely the initial investment has left the city."

"Every time you send a dollar out of town," continued "Bill," "you not only send that dollar but you send the interest on that dollar for this year for next year and for every year that it stays in circulation. Instead of helping La Grande it helps some other city with all of its power, and the foolish citizen who sends his money away gives no heed to the crime that he or she has committed against the city that feeds and shelters them and gives them the comforts and pleasures of life."

"As a matter of records the real facts are even stronger, for you not only send the interest for all future years, when you send your money out of town, but you send the interest on the interest—the entire sum that would have been saved to La Grande by the help of compound interest."

"It is time for every citizen to find out how loyal they are to their own city," continued "Bill" Dollar, "you are either for it or against it—your actions prove your loyalty better than words."

"La Grande people who spend their money with merchants in

other cities are not doing their share towards building up La Grande and this city's growth and prosperity depends on that very thing—buying at home.

"There should be no excuse for such a condition to exist here, but it does, and a large percent of the retail trade that belongs to the home merchants is going elsewhere. Proof of this is seen with the shoppers bringing their purchases home or having them shipped by express or parcel post."

"La Grande business men visit towns in this neighborhood, and point out the advantage of trading in La Grande when people cannot make the purchases they want to in the smaller communities, while scores of La Grande people are going elsewhere to spend their money."

"What is the result?" said "Bill" Dollar. "There is not as much employment for money is scarcer, and the employer cannot afford to pay for so many employees—this in time causes a decrease in population. If La Grande people would give their trade to the home merchants, instead of spending it elsewhere, the merchants could afford to enlarge their business and give buyers a larger line to select from."

"If La Grande people will spend their money here, there will be more taxes paid and more municipal improvements will come. La Grande cannot hope to grow and have prosperous business conditions if this practice is continued, for as soon as business begins to feel the effect the people in town will be hurt and with their positions gone they will have to move to other towns."

"This condition may not be prevented by one or two, or a score, stopping the habit of trading elsewhere. It must be a concerted movement on the part of the whole community—everybody must do it. It is time for every person in La Grande to stop and examine their own conduct and see whether the small, and sometimes fancied, gain of trading in other towns is worth the greater eventual loss."

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Two Shot, 20 Injured in Student Riot Last Night at Providence

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 29

(AP)—Two persons were shot, one a spectator, seriously, and 20 others were injured in a student demonstration at Brown university last night which started in the annual freshman "ice-burning" celebration and led to a pitched battle between students and police.

Eight students were arrested. Sam Flora, football and baseball player from Warren, Ohio, who was to have played against the Harvard nine here today, was taken to the Rhode Island hospital, with a broken arm after his arrest.

Who died the shooting was undetermined today. Many students carried pistols which they fired in the celebration.

More casualties might have resulted had not Kenneth O. Mason, dean of freshmen, prevailed on the undergraduates, who swarmed to the support of the freshmen regardless of class, not to "rush" the east side tunnel entrances to which were guarded by nearly 100 police.

Mason warned the milling students they would only aggravate a bad situation.

William Berarducci, a spectator, who was shot in one eye while watching the rock, egg and riot-stick fight between freshmen and police outside the Arcadia ballroom in the downtown district, was reported at Rhode Island hospital to be in a serious condition.

John E. Krebs, of Cleveland, a student, was shot, in the wrist, but was said at the Homeopathic hospital to be in no danger.

Arthur Sondheim, of Brookline, Mass., star varsity pitcher was injured on the right arm by a police club in disturbance near the campus. Like Flora, Sondheim was to have started against Harvard today.

Other injured students included: Dean Coffin, Detroit, Mich., president freshman class, lacerations of scalp.

Tom Snyder, Pittsburgh, Pa., injury to left eye.

J. Paul Benson, Quincy, Mass., injury to left arm.

Jack Walsh, Davenport, Iowa, laceration of scalp.

POLICE HOPE TO FIX CRIME ON WOMAN, 65

MACON, Ga., May 30 (AP)—Police delved into the past of Mrs. J. C. Powers, 65, rooming house proprietor for a possible solution of several crimes similar to the slaying last Tuesday of James Parks, whom Earl Manchester confessed he shot to death for \$1000 the woman offered to pay.

The disappearance of one man on whose life she held an insurance policy, the subsequent death of the agent who issued the policy, and the burning of two houses on which she collected insurance, were the mysteries officers hoped to link with the slaying of Parks.

Although Mrs. Powers repudiated her confession that she conspired with Manchester to kill Parks, Manchester himself expanded an earlier statement to police, and said the woman offered him \$1000 to "do the job" so she might collect the \$14,000 due on a \$7000 double indemnity policy she had taken out on Parks' life.

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., May 29 (AP)—Nine pilots roared away from Parks airport at one minute intervals beginning at 10:20 a. m. today on a nonstop race to Indianapolis and return, inaugurating the \$75,000 Gardner Trophy race, nation's new Memorial Day speed classic.

At 125 miles, the original field of 33 starters had been reduced to 27 due to one death and forced withdrawals of five others because of mechanical troubles.

The car was being moved away from a string of 12 cars, which had been ignited by an explosion of a tank car.

The dead: F. W. Hutcherson, yardmaster for the Chicago and Alton at Slater; Hugh Cole, brakeman on the burning train; Harold Fishback, switchman on a roller train sent from Slater to clear the track.
