The use of washing soda makes cleaning pots and kettles less laborious. It is best to fill the utensil with hot water as high as it requires cleaning, add a teaspoonful of soda to the water and set it over the fire to heat.

Farm Pointers

To rid fowls of lice, apply Black Leaf Forty to the top of the roosts with a small paint brush just before the birds go up for the night. One application lasts for at least two days, and usually kills all or most of the lice. (See the Oregon Experiment station.)

Mites are a serious hindrance to the welfare of the hens and breed rapidly in hot weather, says the Oregon Experiment station. They will be found under the roosts and where the roosts connect with the house or hanger. The treatment is carbolic acid or a strong sheep-dip painted on full strength.

When the warm days of summer and a scarcity of green feed causes the hens to stop laying, moist mash acts as a stimulant and usually helps up the production or improves it, the Oregon Experiment station finds. It may be fed for about two weeks at the rate of about three pounds to 100 birds, or as much as they will clean up in 15 or 20 minutes. It is mixed with buttermilk or skim milk to a crumbly consistency.

An important factor in the well-being of the young pulets is to have them on the roosts by the time they are six weeks old. Crowding on the floor and in the corners of the brooding house hinders satisfactory growth. It may be necessary to resort to forced roosting for a few nights, but it pays, says the Oregon experiment station.

An ample supply of fresh green feed during the warm summer days is essential both to the growing stock and the layers.
