## Recital Described In Salem Column

In the society column of Thursday evening, a program was given of a junior recital given at Salem by Miss Helene Price, of this city, a music student at Willamette university. In commenting on Miss Price's program, the Salem Statesman has the following to say:—

A recital that stepped out of the amateur into the young artist class was given Tuesday evening by Miss Helene Price, a junior of Willamette university piano department, pupil of Frances Virginia Mottson. Miss Price played artistically throughout a program taxing to one of more mature years and added experience. The program opened with the Bach Fantasy, clearly played with a tone penetrating and clear but never with that sharp, severe quality given so often to the Schubert Impromptu Op. 90, No. 1, and this by the Schumann Novelties.

There were three MacDowell numbers; Cardas which allowed Miss Price to display her finger technique, and gave insight into hours of concentrated work. The Burlesque, well pictured in its humorous vein, was followed by the "Tragic Sonata." Then came Mendelssohn's Pleyce Cloud and Agitation.

Miss Price's ability to weave intricate passages into a really artistic whole was pronounced in the Debussy number Arabesque No. 1, The Chopin Nocturne Op. 15, No. 2 had the singing tone so necessary to its rendition. In the final number the Beethoven Concerto D# Major, Allegro, Largo and Rondo, Miss Price was ably assisted by Miss Doris Corbin at the second piano. Miss Corbin merits much praise for adding in a decidedly artistic way to the finish of an interesting program.
