PORTLAND, Ore., June 1 (AP)—A drop of 20 cents a barrel in bothakers and family flours was the most material change in the local market today.

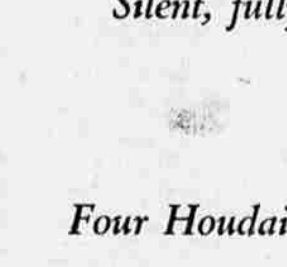

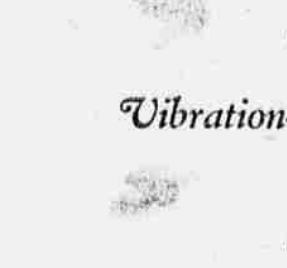

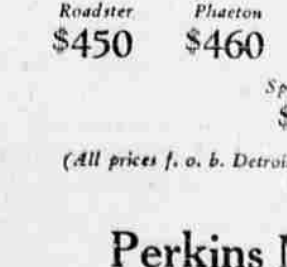
