Providing for alternate jurors to prevent mistrials in event of inability or death of regular jurors.

Abolishing court of domestic relations in Multnomah county and making judge of that court a circuit judge.

Increasing salaries of circuit judges.

Providing for licensing of real estate and stamping of deeds as protection against cattle rustling.

Providing for revocation of license to drive motor vehicle while drunk.

Two acts for appointive salaries tax commission and state wide control of assessments by this commission.

Reforestation act.

A measure placing in the state corporation department the regulation of corporations owning or controlling a majority of any bank stock, and directed at Bancorporation, is not effective until January 1, next.

Bill Dollar Provides Profit For Local Merchants During Travels

Wagon that delivers the goods. "So long as the circle is unbroken—goods for money and money for goods—the balance of trade is maintained. It has not only a place in which to sell, for the money is at hand to serve as the medium way."



"Bill" Dollar up to the present time has passed through the hands of many of our local merchants in the regular course of business and each one has made a legitimate profit from him.

"This condition can keep up until I pass through the hands of all the local merchants," said "Bill" Dollar, "and so long as I remain in Union county under the care of local citizens, I will work for them and build anything they want me to, for my power for good is unlimited in this county. The thousands of bills that are circulating here will work in the same way if properly guided."

"If the money spent on worthless stock and other wildcat schemes by our home people in the last ten years had been invested in home development and new industries, many new places of business would now be in evidence. From all that I can hear," continued "Bill," "La Grande is destined to become quite a large distributing center because of its natural advantages, but the consummation of its hope will be delayed if people persist in buying goods away from this county when they can be obtained here."

"Money that is earned in Union county by either employer or employee and kept circulating at home will establish the business and manufacturing plants that could be used to good advantage in this community right now."

"The cycle of a home working dollar is a small one if it is treated fairly. The employee gets it, spends it with the local merchant who buys his goods from wholesale houses in this city, where possible, and they in turn pay it out as salaries. The money is invested in a substantial profit or a home, in turn giving employment to many other employees who come here to take a place in the new industries."

"On the other hand, the cycle of a disloyal dollar is short. The employee gets it and because he is always under the impression that things are cheaper somewhere else, sends it away to some other city and neither the local merchant, wholesaler or banker gets the good of it, and the other city gets "Bill" Dollar and puts him to work in his own community."

"Or to put the matter in another way, do not think of money as a commodity, for it is only a medium for the exchange of commodities (either goods or labor). Under proper conditions, a man who pays out money does not part with anything, he merely gives up something that he has received for value in some other previous transaction, and receives value back again. In other words, all through this life, he gives up commodity for money in endless chain. The money itself is nothing more than the
