Helen Wills Is Title Winner In Paris Tourney

ROSLAND GARDENS STADIUM, Paris, June 2 (AP)—Helen Wills again has demonstrated her right to sit on the throne as queen of the world's tennis courts.

She won the women's singles championship of the French hard court tournament yesterday by defeating the No. 1 ranking player of France, Mme. Hane Mathieu, 6-2, 6-4, in the final round.

The American girl's victory not only gave her the French title for the second year in succession but showed clearly at the same time that she ranks in a class by herself among women tennis players.

Mme. Mathieu put up a plucky fight but wherever there was need to apply pressure Miss Wills clearly demonstrated her superiority. She trailed, three to two, in the first set and then ran out four games in a row to win. In the second, Mme. Mathieu pulled even at four games all only to see the American take the next two in easy fashion for set, match and championship.

John Horatia stunned a crowd of 12,000 yesterday by eliminating Henri Cochet, ranking No. 1 player of the world in a thrilling five-set match.

Bill Tilden, with Frank Hunter, played a row of matches in Zurich and then will go to Holland for the Dutch championships beginning June 16. From Holland the American leaves for Wimbledon for the British championships.

Both the Athletics and Cardinals, the two league leaders, helped themselves by doing nothing at all, and the cause of the Pirates certainly was not injured by inactivity which prevailed in Pittsburgh.

Although George Pipgras, aided by Lou Gehrig's twelfth hole run, pitched the Yankees to their second straight decision over the White Sox by 6 to 1 at the Yankee stadium, the Browns were nosed out in Washington by 2 to 1. This defeat dropped the St. Louisans to a position five and one-half games behind the Athletics as the Yankees crept up to within seven and one-half contests of the leaders.

Connie Mack nevertheless signed an important game over 24, only in the last column where he now has a margin of seven contests over each of his nearest competitors. It is well known, of course, that baseball players and managers estimate the standing exclusively on the figures of the games lost column.

Six-Hit Game In defeating the White Sox, Pipgras allowed but six hits. Kerr's single and Metzler's triple in the third saved Chicago from a shut-out.

After trailing St. Louis by 1 to 0 for several innings, Washington tied the score against George Blumenthal in the eighth and then won out in the ninth on Joe Conkin's double and two sacrifices. Irvin Hartley won his first victory of the season against seven defeats.

M'KENNON WINS TRIP TO CHICAGO

Quarter Miler From La Grande will Participate in Intercollegiate.

Clare McKennon, former La Grande High school student and athlete, and resident of Union county, reached a higher position in track circles at Eugene last Saturday than any other middle-distance runner from this part of the state when he zipped off the 440-yard dash in 49.4 to win the northwest conference title.

McKennon, whose victory was an upset in dope, turned in a 5.9 fifth on Friday in the preliminaries but Hartley, of Washington, had been doped to win. McKennon's feat was all the more remarkable in view of the fact that it was run in the rain. The mark tied the Northwest record.

Will Compete in Chicago As a result of his victory, McKennon will go to Chicago to represent Oregon in the national intercollegiate June 7 and 8. Accompanying him from Oregon will be Ed McEller, discus star, and Ralph Hill, miler.

Another La Grande student, who has been honored by being elected captain of the University of Oregon track team, scored three points in the northwest meet Saturday. George Stager, also a graduate of La Grande high, took third in the discus and fourth in the javelin.

Score Eight Points McKennon and Stager together counted eight of Oregon's points and if either one had dropped down a notch, Oregon would have been third in standings instead of second, as the university nosed out of Washington State college for the runner-up position by the margin of one point.

Nineteen Northwest stars will participate in the intercollegiate at Chicago. Washington is to send 11 men and Washington State will send five.

Incidentally, La Grande will have an enthusiastic fan at the Chicago meet in the person of Dr. William Peure, who is going east and plans to stop for the Stager meet. Dr. Peure held the state high school half mile mark at 2:02 for many years and his record still stands in Eastern Oregon.

EUGENE, Ore., June 3 (AP)—Three University of Oregon athletes, accompanied by William Hayward, coach, were today on their way to Chicago where they will compete in the national intercollegiate track and field meet Friday and Saturday. The three men are Ed McEller, claimant of the world discus record; Ralph Hill, who ran the mile Saturday in the northern section meet here in 4:17.2; and Clare McKennon, who won the quarter mile from a star field, including Hartley, Washington's great runner.

McEller broke the Pacific coast conference discus mark here Saturday when he heaved the platter 153 feet 10 3/4 inches to win from Paul Jessup of Washington. On the first of three allowed extra attempts the brunette Oregon giant sent the discus 157 feet 2 inches. The old record was held by Bud Houser, of Southern California. His record was 154 feet 7 1/2 inches, made three years ago. Steve Anderson, America's premier hurdler, led a small but mighty band of athletes to an overwhelming triumph for the University of Washington in Saturday's northern division meet here. He tied the world record for the second time in his life in the high hurdles. He made it in 14.4 seconds.

The scores for the meet were: Washington 59; Oregon 27; Washington State 24; Oregon State 20 1/2; Idaho 2 and Montana 1 1/2.
