WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—

Bill Dollar, If Kept At Home, Will Create Additional Business

"I overheard a merchant talking today about increased business," said "Bill" Dollar. "There are two ways of getting more business," he said. "One is to take business away from our competitors and the other is to create more business than now exists here."

"There are two ways that business can be created without injuring competitors. First, by growth of population, and second, by increasing the purchasing power of each individual. If La Grande is worth living in it will attract more population, and the community that is fundamentally prosperous will increase its purchasing power."

"Both of these factors," declared the merchant, "depend to a large extent upon the development of the community as a whole. The first responsibility that rests on a man or woman in any community is to be true to their city in every way that is possible. 'Bill' Dollar should never be permitted to leave this city, nor should any of his brothers go away to other cities. They are all needed here at home. The merchants should work for the common welfare too. They should never spend a cent out of La Grande for goods on sale here."

"As a merchant and business man my success depends on the success of the home merchants, and I feel that I owe something to this city far in excess of what the city owes me. Everything I buy shall be from the home merchants, and I shall resist the impulse that comes to me when I go away on buying trips, to purchase goods in other cities for my own personal use. If every merchant here would do that a great many more Bills would be circulating in Union county."

"When I left that man place of business I got into another store," said "Bill" Dollar, "where the head of the firm was singing something like this:

This city owes you a living.
That statement is correct, you see.
You owe the city a first class man.
But can La Grande collect?"
That set me to thinking," said

provides that annuities are to run throughout the period of the debt payments to amounts sufficient to meet them.

Lead to Evacuation
It will also lead to evacuation of the Rhineland by the allied armies of occupation within the space of time required for necessary negotiations and material arrangements to withdraw the foreign army there.

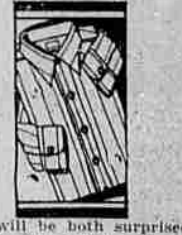
The settlement, in the opinion of all the experts who took part in it, will go farther to consolidate the peace of Europe than anything which has happened since the peace conference.

One consequence much commented upon in allied circles is that it is felt here virtually to make the reparations and debt settlement a German-American problem, since, apart from greatly reduced sums for the reconstruction of devastated regions, the greater portion of annuities will go to meet payments by the United States war debtors.
