GRAIN REPEATS - MONDAY'S SPURT

Wheat Jumps Six Cents
During Last Half Hour
of Trade in Chicago.

CHICAGO, June 4 (AP)—Grain prices repeated today their sensational spurt of yesterday, wheat jumping 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 a bushel in the last half hour of trading, after news came from Washington that congressional leaders favored immediate appropriation of \$500,000,000 for stabilization of agriculture. Wheat closed at the day's top, \$1.95 3/4 for July contracts and \$1.93 1/2 for September delivery. Corn, too, shared the bullish enthusiasm and advanced 3 1/2 to 5 1/2 at the close, with July contracts selling at 89 1/2 to 90 1/2 cents a bushel and September at 91 to 91 1/2 cents.

Oats closed 1 1/2 to 1 5/8 cents up. CHICAGO, June 4 (AP)—With buying started at an end for at least the time being, the wheat market turned downward today after an irregular start. Liverpool wheat quotations gave an encouragement to purchase, and reports of rain affording relief from drought in Argentina tended further to bring about price setbacks here. Opening 3/4 off to 5/8 cents up, Chicago wheat later underwent a general decline. 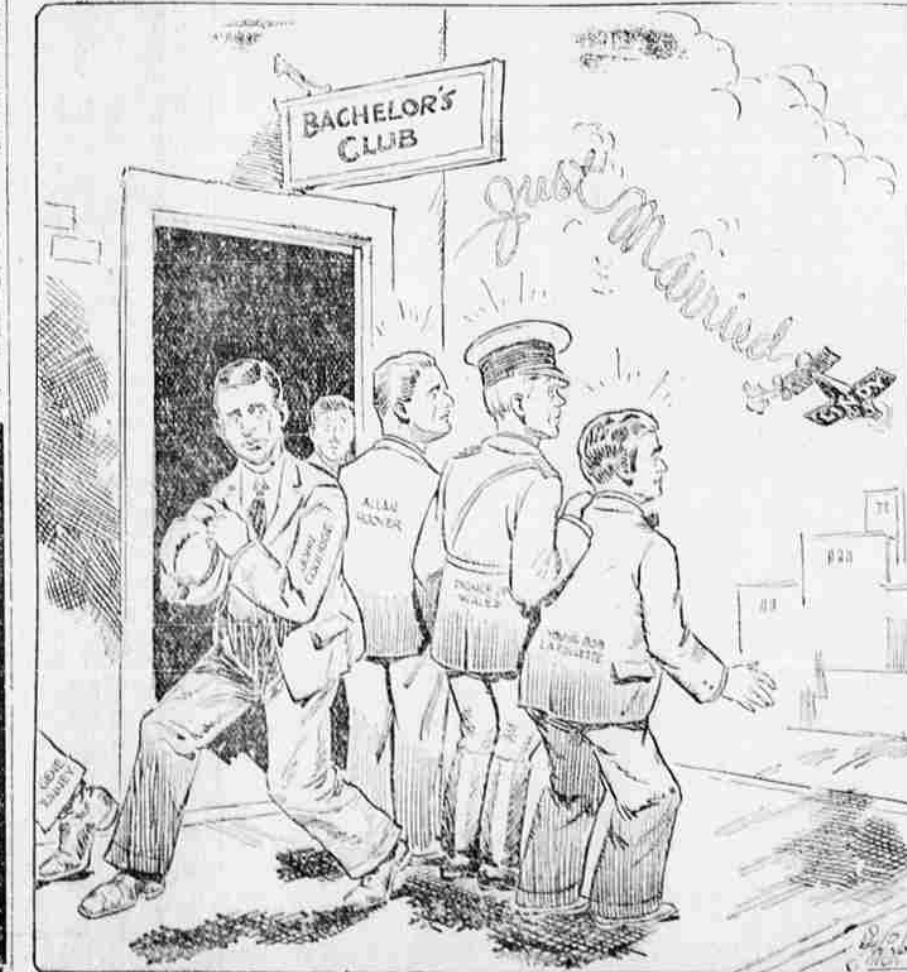

Berry Price Is Lower Today In Oregon Market

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4 (AP)—Strawberries prices were down, this time, perhaps, for good, cantaloupes were cheaper and the first cantaloupe or teal watermelons were due Wednesday.

Growers bringing berries in early Tuesday sold for \$2 a crate, with some of off quality going at \$1.75. Middleman wholesale prices were \$2.25 to \$2.50. The retailers will base his price between these two figures. The berries were plentiful but not as good as they might be. Lack of sunshine has deprived them of some of their sugary quality.

Cantaloupes were more abundant with a consequent decrease in value.

The carload of Klondike watermelons due Wednesday were grown in Imperial valley and will sell for six cents a pound wholesale. This price was regarded as reasonable for this period.

Butter standards dropped half a cent to 42 1/2 cents and current egg receipts advanced half a cent to 28 1/2 today.

Other egg and butter grades were unchanged. Poultry and fresh meats were still firm.

Closing Strong In Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—Stock prices made further recovery in today's market on buying influenced by reported improvements in the credit situation and favorable trade and earnings reports. Wide-spread rumors were in circulation in the financial district that the Federal Reserve board had relaxed its credit policy and that an increase in rediscount rate was now unlikely.

Operations for the advance were continued in the late trading when gains of from five to six points were made by several leaders, such as Wright Aero, Radio, National Cash Register, Greene Cananea Copper, Sears Roebuck and United Air Craft. The closing was strong with sales approximating 3,200,000 shares.

BOSTON, June 4 (AP)—There is a very moderate movement of 50s, 48s and 50s fleeces wool. A fair number of inquiries are being received on these lines, but only few sales are being closed. Prices are steady as compared with last week's quotations.

KING IS IMPROVING

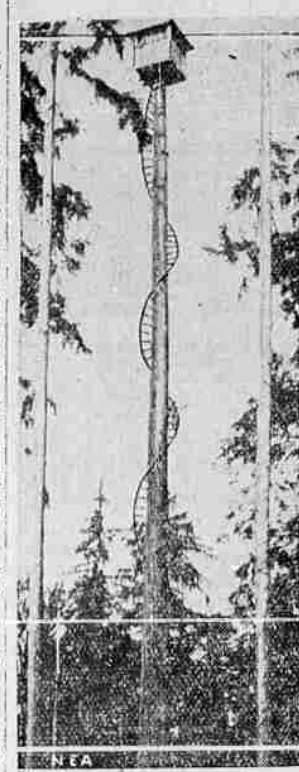

Usually the forest ranger's look-out cabin is on an almost inaccessible mountaintop. But up in the Quinalt Indian reservation in Washington, the problem of safeguarding the billions of feet of Indian timber soon to be sold, was solved by perching a 19x10-foot cabin atop a 170-foot Douglas fir. After the tree was trimmed, all parts of the cabin were hoisted, piece by piece, and bolted together. Steel bars, driven into the trunk and lashed together with steel cable, form the ladder, and the forest ranger is the tiny speck about half way up the ladder.
