WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—Oregon would constitute one judicial district and the time set for terms of the district court would

be changed under terms of a bill introduced in the house today by Representative Butler of Oregon. Under the terms of Butler's measure, court would be held at Portland on the first Mondays in March, July and November; at Pendleton on the first Tuesday in
