

ATHLETICS DROP GAME TO DETROIT

Yanks Squeeze Through to Get 4-2 Decision—Cubs Turn Back Giants

Chipman (Associated Press Sports Editor) The long, long trail ended for the Athletics and the Giants yesterday when the Tigers and the Cubs spent their respective afternoons in getting a big revenge for recent indignities but no great cheer was heard to go up from the camps of the Browns and the Yankees out of the general state of affairs in the American league. The New York entry gained one full game on the Flying Machine as a result of the day's proceedings and the Browns held their ground, but neither received any assurances that Professor Connie Mack would not go forward again in an early date.

The Athletics were due to lose a game sometime, and it had to be the veteran John Pless to lose who succumbed to Detroit bats. After the dean of all the pitchers retired from the field of action, Mr. Mack tried the daring experiment of expelling Oswald Orvell to open the fire, with the result that the Tigers needed their victory by 8 to 4. It was the accomplishment of home runs that was enough to squeeze out the decision over Red Evers and the White Sox by 4 to 2.

The Yankees now have seen four successive starting pitchers finish their games. The Browns suffered a heart-breaking reverse at Washington when the Senators, themselves with no particular destination, turned loose a six-run rally in the ninth to win by 8 to 7. The Senators got nowhere, and the Browns fell one game nearer the Yanks.

Jimmy Zinn turned in five-hit pitching to defeat Charlie Ruffing and Jack Russell at the home of the Red Sox. The score was 4 to 0.

Cubs Win with Home Run Turned back in three games on their home field, the Cubs tied five home runs at Giant pitching to save the last game of the series by 10 to 9.

The victory continued the Cubs in third place. The Giants remain the fourth rung of the ladder as the Pirates again got even with the Phillies, this time by 8 to 5.

The Cardinals got only an even break against the Hobbs, winning the first game by 3 to 1 and permitting Brooklyn to take the second by 11 to 8. The Cubs remained comfortably in first place, but both the Pirates and the Cubs gained a hit.

OUTSIDER WINS FAMOUS DERBY

W. Barnett's Trigo, a 33 to 1 Shot, Romps Home at Epsom Downs.

EPSOM DOWNS, England, June 5 (AP)—W. Barnett's Trigo, an outsider at 33 to 1, ran away from a picked field of 25 rivals to win the 14th running of the famous English derby here today.

Before an immense crowd estimated by one official at "nearly a million," this comparatively obscure son of Blandford and Athol romped home a winner by one and one-half lengths.

As the game colt tore down the slope of the straightway to register one of the many upsets recorded in the long history of this famous classic, literally millions of dollars changed hands throughout the entire world where wagering and participation in the mammoth sweepstakes is believed to have totaled nearly \$100,000,000.

Favorites Missed In that final rush for the finish which is accentuated in the famous track, thousands of eyes searched in vain among the leaders for such popular favorites as Crugadore, Mr. Jinks and Hunter's Moon.

Of the three show horses, Walter Gay, which finished second, was the best liked in the pre-race speculation. Brevis which came home third, two lengths farther back, was held at the extremely long odds of 50 to 1.

Water Gay had been one of the heaviest tipped horses in the event for the last few days and his finishing showing was well received. There had been some doubt before the race as to whether he would start as his popular owner, Lord Woolavington, had served warning that the hard ground might keep him out of the field.

Kopi Falls Kopi, which was one of the most heavily backed outsiders, had the misfortune to fall near the baggage-doors "Tatterham's Corner," his jockey, F. N. Winter, escaped injury.

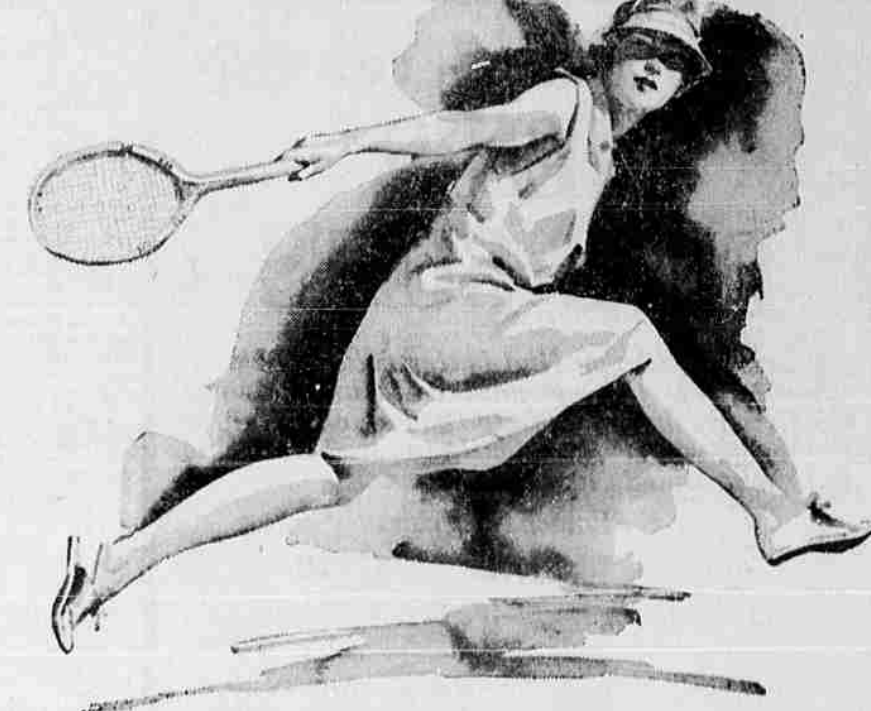
