### GRAIN MARKETS LOSE BUOYANCY

#### Wheat Prices Sag Over Three Cents a Bushel—Corn Also Down.

CHICAGO, June 5 (AP)—The grain markets today lost the buoyancy born of optimism over farm relief legislation and values drifted downward despite the agreement of congressional conferees on a farm bill with the export debate plan eased. Wheat prices sagged from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents the bushel and corn was 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents lower at the finish.

CHICAGO, June 5 (AP)—Feverish activity and rapidly fluctuating values within a range of about 2 cents wheat prices have averaged lower early today. The fact that Liverpool wheat quotations failed to advance even half as much as had been looked for in view of yesterday's upturn on this side of the Atlantic led to heavy selling here, and to a manifestly two-sided market. Opening unchanged to 2 cents lower. Chicago wheat later rose at times to almost yesterday's finish, but failed to hold. Corn and oats also tended irregularly downward, corn starting 1/4 off to 1/2 cent up and subsequently showing an all-around rise. Provisions were firm. Wheat closed nervous, 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cent out lower; corn, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cent down, 1/2 to 1 1/4 cent off, and provisions varying 1/2 decline to a rise of 1/2 cents.
