

### HAPPY MARRIAGE IS QUITE SIMPLE

So Says Dr. J. E. Dillard, Baptist Pastor and Famous Writer-Lecturer

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—The most carping critics of marriage as an institution are those too indifferent to work out a feasible plan for marital success and adhere to it.

This is the opinion of Dr. J. E. Dillard, Baptist pastor and widely known writer-lecturer.

"By their own actions critics undermine the foundations of happy married life, and when their homes come tumbling down they blame marriage," Dr. Dillard says. "The number of divorces in proportion to marriages would be materially lowered if the woman would put as much time into homemaking and effort to make her husband happy as she does in trying to find reasons for divorce."

Dr. Dillard listed 10 commandments for housewives, which he said would make marriage successful, if observed. They are:

"Thou shalt remember thy marriage vows, and act as thou thinkest other married women ought to act."

"Thou shalt determine to make thy marriage a success and be willing to pay the price thereof. Study, plan, work, pray, give and forgive if thou wouldst make success of thy marriage."

"Thou shalt learn to work in 'double harness.' Study thy husband, his likes and dislikes; stress thy duties rather than thy rights."

"Thou shalt keep thyself attractive in person and manner. Look thy best, be thy sweetest and never nag. Never say cutting things about folks, especially his folks, and most especially his mother."

"Thou shalt watch the little things. Keep the house clean; cook his favorite dishes; see that buttons are sewed on and the mending done."

"Thou shalt sympathize with thy husband in his trials and help him in his business. Put thyself in his place; don't expect luxuries and comforts he cannot afford. Be economical but not stingy."

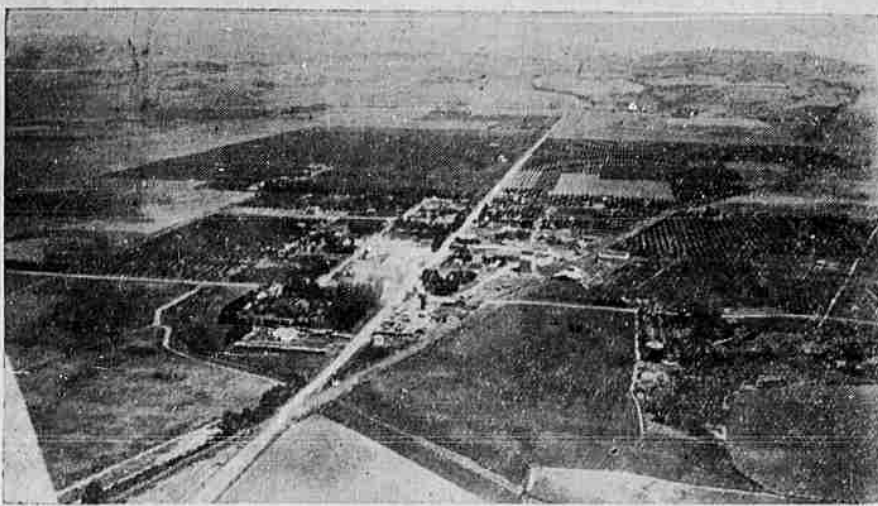
"Thou shalt make thy home so attractive that thy husband will not want to go to his club or the smoker for a little peace and comfort."

"Thou shalt never compromise thy convictions of right and duty, but be careful not to mistake thy selfishness and stubbornness for convictions."

"Thou shalt not pity thyself nor talk of thy ailments unduly nor let others persuade you that you are having a hard time. Your success will be worth all it costs and more."

"Thou shalt be a Christian every day at home as well as at church and in society, and when thou hast made a mistake, back up and try again."

#### Careful Arrangement

The administration building has been planned with the arrangements of the rooms particularly in mind. Throughout the structure everything has been built in as efficient and convenient manner as is possible and local educators, who have inspected the building, praise the arrangements and construction highly.

Turning into the building from the imposing entrance on the south side, one enters a beautiful vestibule and hall, done in Honduras mahogany. The remainder of the interior woodwork in the building is of vertical grain fir.

Turning to the right, walking over the variegated tile floors of the main entrance hall and vestibule, one finds the offices of the president, H. E. Inlow, divided into a private office and a general office. To the right of these rooms and connected with a series of doors so arranged that one may enter the hall, the private office of the office to the right without going through any of the other rooms—is a room in which is located the telephone switchboard with an electric clock nearby.

To the east of this room is another office, to be used by the executive secretary. In the wings are located spacious class rooms, well lighted with large windows, and decorated with a light buff shade pleasing to the eye. Powerful light units, which also protect the eyes from glare, insure adequate artificial illumination for every room in the entire building on

cloudy days or at night. Each class room is also equipped with an electric clock and offices lead off from some of the class rooms.

#### Library in West Wing

In the west wing, at the end of the long, wide hall, is the large library, with built-in shelves, magazine racks, librarian's desk, etc. It is particularly well lighted.

The library, with the president's group of offices, the seven class rooms, and a cloak and retiring rooms, completes the first floor divisions. The music room is to the left of the main entrance, conveniently located in reference to other class rooms.

The second floor contains the large auditorium with an adequate stage and dressing rooms, as well as eight classrooms. The basement will be used for corrective gymnasium work and laboratories, and in the west end of the basement is the modern heating plant, consisting of two units fed by automatic stokers.

#### Modern Heating Plant

An approved and modern system of heating and ventilating is provided for the building, with thermostatic control of the heating and with thermometers placed in each room. The radiators warm circulating air which is passed out into each room so as to insure an even temperature, and the thermostats prevent overheating.

Floors in the corridor and halls are covered with linoleum and all lavatories are provided with floors of tile and plumbing of the most modern and sanitary manufacture. The floors in the class rooms are waxed in a natural color and are constructed of fir.

Two fireproof stair towers are placed near the end of the building, providing easy and safe exit from the building. Throughout the building, everything possible for the convenience

of both students and instructors has been incorporated in the construction. In the class rooms, for example, strips of cork-like material are placed above the composition blackboards, for posting bulletins and class work, and doing away with any necessity of marring the blackboards.

A main bulletin board is conveniently located in the hallway on the first floor directly facing the main entrance.

Adjacent to the girls' cloak room is a large rest room. Steel lockers are to be installed in the boys' cloak room, it is said.

Much of the furnishings have already arrived and some have been installed in the president's group of offices. Folding seats for students of American walnut and of strong construction, are at present stored in the basement but will be placed in the class rooms very shortly.

The Iron Firemen in the heating system were supplied by Fred Spaeth, the piano by the Eastern Oregon Music company and the Victrola by Adlers Music company.

The gymnasium, power house and other buildings would follow as soon as finances permitted.

The entire plans for the campus have been arranged to provide for the increase in Eastern Oregon's educational needs over a great many years. It is so planned that whether the growth be slow or rapid, the construction will proceed along set lines that will maintain the school in harmony with the needs.

Many who are deeply interested in educational advancement are of the belief that it will not be long until the La Grande school will become a four-year college, which will necessitate additional buildings.

Humbert Fugazy, after several seasons in the promotion business with nothing but red ink on the

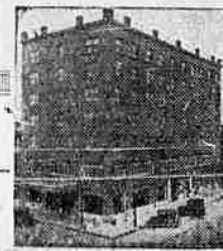
